
Evening

The infinite detail provided by modern timekeeping equipment for every aspect of speed was displayed in a Longines film and covered everything from the cycling Tour de France to Formula One racing. 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Club Circuit

Sunday, 23rd February saw many enthusiasts and spectators arriving at the Club Circuit. Pukekohe, to soak up the sunshine and racing.

Notable was the large contingent of Imp drivers - Roy Harrington being by far the quickest in practice until a bent valve finished his racing for the day: the distinction of fastest Imp then being handed to Ted Dutch and his chess-board topped version.

The first event of the day was the standard production saloons proving a win for Jim Palmer and his Monaro after a door handle swapping dice with Tony Rolley's 3.8 Jaguar.

Another notable point being the fact that the twin cam Fiat 125 didn't really run away from the 1500's of the same stable.

0-1000 Imp race was dominated by Ted Dutch with a strong challenge put in by N. Fergusson who gained second place.

The 0-1000 mixed saloons big race was livened by some fantastic dicing between Barry Phillips and Peter Levet with line honours being shared between them.

Mary Donald again turned on the performance now expected of her and dominated the 1001-1300 class.

The big modified saloons turned out to be the crowd thriller with Noel Goodwin's MK II Zephyr sounding every bit the part but even he had to bow out to Kevin Masterton in the Mini Ford 1500 until Jim Richards borrowed Jim Carney's twin cam Ford Escort and headed him off.

The sports cars were again poorly represented and this class was run with the Formula (anything goes) class. A. Hopkins in the Cooper Norton winning line honours from Peter Bruin's Cooper Vincent.

The Formula Vees didn't have the usual ten entries but the racing was again close, interest in this class dwindling, however, when B. Wainwright hit a tree much to the disgust of his rear suspension.

Another notable incident was Graham Tanner's excursion into the fence at the loop after finding that his brake pipe had fractured, leaving him without stopping power of any description, his A40 Farina suffering damage to the passenger's side.

Thankfully, in the above incidents no-one was hurt.

In all a good day's racing watched by a crowd of some 1500 people.








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The following "Rules of the Road in English", were allegedly posted in the Central Police Station, Tokyo.

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Brands Hatch, what it is really like

A lively discourse on motor racing by an English writer - Ronald Collier

For one brainwashed at an early age into believing that Brands is a jar of shrimp paste, and convinced that a Hatch can be nothing but an object that gets stove in during typhoons, it is not easy to associate the words Brands Hatch with anything but a Picasso painting.

Brands (the Hatch'is ignored by the cognoscenti like the bottom button of the waistcoat) is, in fact, a bosky dell in Kent abutting a major highway built to carry one-fifth of the coast-bound traffic it has to bear.

Interlacing the gentle green and wooded slopes is a tortuous ribbon of macadam nearly three miles long.

The faithful flock there each weekend and few congregations offer the newly-converted such a stimulating symphony of colour, sound and scent.

Laurel Wreaths

The clumps of multi-coloured exhortations to fit Dunodo and Ferlop, to read the Motorcar, to fill up with Shesso the laurel wreaths waiting to be hung around the necks the powerful odour of frying onions.

The deep liturgical voice over the loudspeaker summoning Bert to the chief marshal's office the gaily striped umbrellas blowing themselves inside out the noisy laughter in the caravans where the VIPs are living it up the grandstand bar.

There is also motor racing for those who are restless.

This, as a score of notices warn you, is a dangerous sport. The chief danger is that you will make a fathead of yourself if you think you understand what is going on and say so in a voice that can be overheard.

Racing begins with a figure in armlet and blazer (about two score of these crowd the arena serving purposes the onlooker can only guess at) walking boldly into the path of a platoon of cars drawn up in silent but menacing of three.
