


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Wembleying on the Motogard

Two Hiace Mini buses, hired from Dominion Rent-a-car and picked up on the Sunday morning, toured around the Auckland suburbs to pick up assorted people and their gear before meeting at Western Springs in the early afternoon.

Motogard banners had been graciously supplied and these were attached to both sides of each van. Rob Nasey's artistic talents were put to work with a marker pen and the official unpaid Wembley spectator team was once again in action.

Western Springs was the scene for the first special stage of the 1979 Motogard, which was run with 4 cars on the track at once. This was quite spectacular, particularly Pentti Airikkala who used the banking round the outside to great effect.

The Wembley crews then headed off south and parked in Findlay Road to see the whole field through. While competitors had a tour of the Coromandel peninsula, we had 40 winks parked in a stage near Waihi. This looked more interesting, as the road went hard left after a long wooden bridge and it caught out quite a few competitors. Mike Marshall had to have a second go at the corner after he nosed into the Wembley banner, and Howard Collier brushed it with his boot.

Just as we were thinking of packing up, a car came across the bridge and didn't lift off until going through the shrubbery into an adjacent field. Having helped him through a gateway and back onto the road, the very next car investigated the hole in the bushes with the result that his back wheels were about two feet off the ground. He was lifted back onto the road and sent on his way.

At Te Puke, we invaded a cafe which had just opened it's doors for the day. Somehow we ended up with an extra plate of runny eggs on Toast. After a well earned breakfast, we headed on to Rotorua and Wembley President Chris Hudson's batch for a few hours kip. It's amazing how 14 bodies can find sleeping space in a small batch.

We followed the rally on down through Rotorua and Taupo, spectating at various stages on the way, and just outside Taumarunui we again found ourselves with a bit of time for a kip. This didn't last very long as another group had acquired what appeared to be extraneous fence posts, which made excellent bonfire material on this cold night.

At New Plymouth, we had a few hours in a Motel and then replenished our depleted supplies before setting off on the third and final devision. In the middle of one of the longest stages of the Rally we helped a Mazda change a flat tyre by saving him the time of jacking up the car.





We saw the sun rise near Otorohanga as we waited for the cars, the stage delayed for a short time for the school bus to get clear. The Wembley banner was suspended from on overhead cable, and had to be weighted down with spent tubes to help it stop flapping in the breeze.

On and into the Glen Murray area and a hilltop afforded us an excellent view of about a mile of road. We just made the last stage in time at Pukekohe to see the front runners through for the last time, then it was on to the George for a jug before going home.

Mikkola and Vatanen were both impressive to watch as were the works Datsuns. It was a pity that Airikkala in the works Chevetts retired so early, otherwise we might have seen a different result. It was also good to see Blair Robson and Paul Adams going extremely well, the result of their placings being in doubt right up until the finish.

Wherever we went, there were large crowds of enthusiastic spectators which shows how interesting and popular the International Rally is today. Five years ago, we could find our way down a back country road into the middle of a special stage and be almost the only spectators at that point.

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

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

In 1972 he came 2nd to Roger Clark on the Manx Rally and was also runner-up in the Kleber Rally Scholorship. The next few years went something like this:- 1973 - Concentrated on Ford Escort Mexico Series, becoming a full-time rally driver. Was one of the leading competitors along with Russell Brookes, Tony Pond, etc., and won two

works drives. Also one Group One on Welsh in Alfa Romeo, and Group One on the RAC in an Avenger.

1974/5 - Won the Kleber/Drive-In Rally Scholorship. Prize was a Datsun Violet. Came 12th overall in RAC Rally in Datsun Violet in 1975.

1976 - Again drove for Datsun coming 8th overall on RAC in a single cam violet. Won Jamaica 747 International Rally in Avenger GT, beating Timo Makinen and Ari Vatanen. 3rd overall on Scottish International Rally.

1977 - 1st overall on Mintex International in a Lancia Stratos. Invited to join Ford Team, drove an Escort for the rest of the year, 4th overall on Circuit of Ireland International, 5th overall on RAC, and 3rd in the British Championship won by Ari Vatanen. Also won in December, Castrol Tour of South Africa, a mixture of special stages and race circuits, beating team-mate Jody Scheckter.

1978 - Signed up by Nissan to run Team Datsun Europe. First major Rally was 1000 Lakes in Finland, Andy was 15th overall, 8th on the RAC. Won Wyedean National Rally in Twin-cam engined car.

1979 - 4th overall Rallye de Portugal.

Pentti Airikkala

Airikkala was born in 1945 in Helsinki, Finland. His wife Kirsti was Finnish Ice Racing Champion in 1972. They live in Cookham Dean, England and have two children.

Pentti started rallying in 1965 using an old Volvo in Finnish 'junior' rallies. After a brief foray into racing he rallied for Isuzu, Renault and Opel, being Team Manager for Open (Finland) in 1971 and 1972. In 1974 he first rallied a Vauxhall, using a Group One specification Magnum for home events, and after awards on the 1000 Lakes and two other events became Finnish Champion in the class.

In 1975 Pentti continued to run the DTV Group One Magnum in Finland and drove the 16 valve Group Two version of the car in the Welsh, Scottish and Lombard RAC Internationals. The following year he moved from Vauxhall to Ford and achieved his first British win (The Snowman) and was second on his home International, the 1000 Lakes. His most memorable drive of that year, however, was the Lombard RAC which he led for four of the five days before retiring.

1977 was the first dull year for the Chevette, and Pentti became DTV Castrol Team Leader for the RAC British Championship assault. In May he rook the Group Four car to it's first ever win, the Welsh International, and after winning the Manx International and the Castrol '77 finished the season as runner up in the Championship.

In 1978 Pentti started the season in fine style, winning the Hankiralli in Finland and the Mintex International on consecutive weekends. He was 2nd on the Scottish and 3rd on the Rally of the 1000 Lakes in Finland, giving the Chevette its first ever World Rally Championship points. He won the Castrol National Rally for the second year in succession and finished the season with a victory on the Hitachi Tarmac sprint in Eire.

Pentti continues his association with DTV Castrol for 1979 and will drive the Group Four Chevette on a number of selected Continental events in addition to his British programme which centres on the seven event Sedan Products Open Championship.

It was unfortunate that mechanical problems with the car forced his withdrawal from the Motogard after only one division. There is little doubt that had the car not let him down, he would have stayed with the leaders right the way through.

The 'works' Group 4 Chevette will be converted to right hand drive and will then be driven by Club Member Steve Millen in the CIBIE and other major events during the remainder of this season.



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MAZDA CONFIDENT OF ROTARY ENGINE FUTURE

Developments to the MAZDA Rotary Engine are expected to make the unit more than competitive with the new generation of reciprocating piston engines designed with economy in mind.

Recent changes have improved the rotary engine so dramatically that it is now as good as conventional engines. Independent tests on the MAZDA RX7 reveal its consumption to be as good as rival cars. Sales on the new RX7 sports car in the United Sates have topped 50,000 since the model's introduction in May 1978.

MAZDA is the only motor manufacturer in the world producing rotary engines, and the company is confident about the future of the power unit. Mr Menichi Yamamoto, Managing Director and General Manager of Research and Development at Toyo Kogyo, said in Britain last month that any suitable production engine must be simple, durable, compact, smooth and quiet, with high performance, good fuel economy and reasonable production cost.

Mr Yamamoto pointed out that the MAZDA rotary now meets these criteria. Durability has never been a major problem on the production rotaries, and further improvements came recently with changes to combustion chamber seal and housing metallurgy.

The MAZDA rotary engine is slightly more expensive to produce than a six cylinder engine of similar horsepower. But increased production from the present rate of 8000 a month to around 15,000 would make the cost competitive.

"To our regret, however, the image of the rotary engine has sharply decreased after the energy crisis because of its fuel economy characteristics," said Mr Yamamoto. Recent developments, and those in the pipeline, will see increased use of rotary engines in MAZDA models.

Mr Yamamoto said two problems would be solved before the rotary engine is reintroduced in saloon versions of MAZDAS. The low and medium speed torque must be raised, and the low speed fuel consumption (including that at idling) improved still further.

Toyo Kogyo, manufacturers of MAZDA vehicles in Japan, is working on a third generation of rotary engines, incorporating improvements in three stages. A 15 per cent improvement in fuel consumption will result from the replacement of the thermal reactor by a catalytic converter in those versions sold in Japan and the United States within a year.

Stage 2 will be the adoption of a new type of combustion chamber and a new type of surface discharge spark plug offering an improvement in fuel economy of between eight and ten per cent. MAZDA will also be looking at either electronic fuel injection or an unusual type or supercharging called TISC (Timed Induction with Super Charge).

TSCI offers a 13 to 18 per cent improvement in low and medium speed torque by using a scaled-up version of the air pump which normally injects air into the exhaust ports to reduce unburnt hydrocarbon emissions. This pump compresses air to 30 lbs square inch which is then supplied to an auxiliary side inlet port via a times rotary valve. TISC not only boosts low medium range torque, but allows the use of a higher final drive.

In areas of smoothness, silence and performance, the rotary engine is still ahead of its reciprocating engine equivalent. Big improvements in the engine's efficiency means Toyo Kogyo is not apprehensive about the rotary's role in the motor industry.

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
