



EDITORIAL

"A week in politics is a long time" - "A month on the phonecard scene is an even longer time"

As I write this Editorial and look back on each preceeding month, I can only be amazed at the number of changes that are taking place. After proceeding along peacefully for three years, there has been a sudden explosion of activity, both on the phonecard production and collection scene.

Whilst many may feel uncomfortable and dissatisfied with the sudden changes being introduced, conversely it offers enormous variety and opportunity to a wide ranging interest group.

The number of changes in the various aspects of phonecard collecting and investing are many and of some magnitude. This is evidenced in a number of ways, many of which have been reported or commented on in detail in this magazine.

Starting with the Clubs, evidenced is a boom occurring at the "grass roots" of the hobby. This month's issue contains five pages on "Club & Society News", with a number of Clubs contributing for the first time, including one Club from England. Three Clubs have just announced new premises for the holding of monthly meetings, a change found to be necessary to accommodate increased numbers attending these meetings. A number of Clubs are planning to hold their first major Phonecard Fairs, whilst others will continue the practice following successfull first attempts. A new Club (the first?) is being established in Sydney, whilst another in Brisbane is also becoming established.

Featured on page 27, is AEROPEX 94, which has reproduced the \$20 South Australian, Adelaide card to promote its Philatelic Exhibition. Another area of collecting is thus introduced in addition to the Phonecard Club Promotional Cards - now numbering five. Further interest in collecting will focus on the International Banknote and Phonecard Fairs to be held in Sydney on the 19th and 20th of March respectively, as each features promotional cards to be distributed each day. These are being produced by Pay Tel Australia for the Banknote and Phonecard Fair organisers.

Moving on to the producers and distributors of phonecards we find further major changes taking place. Telecom has announced a major change in its marketing and distribution policy in regards to the introduction of Custom cards (see News Update). Whilst at this stage, only the PACS cards are affected, there will very soon be a further number of independant phonecard producers and distibutors of Telecom endorsed phonecards. Apart from deciding as to whether to collect these cards, be they in Collector Packs or available as single units, collectors will have to obtain/chase these cards from either the

independant distributor or from dealers. It is unlikely that the limited issue, single unit cards will again be obtainable at face value, which they were (limited though the number was) through Telecom.

Telecom themselves are finding it necessary to re adjust their policies, necessary almost on a monthly basis, to cater for the response to innovations they introduce to collectors and investors, eg. a rethink is taking place in regards to the issue number of Limited Edition Collector Packs, the last two of which were greatly oversubscribed and as a consequence find their value on the secondary market to be 300% + in excess of Telecom's issue price. Does Telecom increase the numbers (above 7,000 and 5,000 respectively) to cater for the demand? If so, will it be a truely "Limited Edition", ie. what is the "cut off point", etc.?

Pay Tel Australia is about to release the third issue of its closed user cards which are centred on its system installed on the "Spirit of Tasmania" ferry service.

The company is presently trialling a completely new area (to Australia) of closed user payphone system and if successfull, will open another avenue of collecting. Many will have read in the press or heard on the radio, of the NSW Government's proposal to introduce "free" \$5.00 phonecards to prisoners in their jails, so as they can contact their families as part of the International Year of the Family. As a cartoon in "The Daily Telegraph Mirror" depicted, would this be a "cellular phone". What would these cards be "worth" and how would one obtain them, apart from the obvious way?

The dealers - what do they think of the current upsurge in opportunity and interest? Whilst the number of phonecard (only) dealers grow, a number of stamp and coin dealers continue to diversify into this area of collecting and (particularly) investment. Dealers report that between 25% to 35% of business conducted at Stamp, Coin & Phonecard Fairs, both Nationally and Internationally (as opposed to simply Phonecard Fairs) is focussed on phonecards, a percentage figure which is increasing steadily.

What does all this mean to this magazine and for me? Some readers would be aware that the production of the magazine is a part time "hobby" to me at present. To maintain and improve the magazine's quality and content it is becoming necessary however, to devote considerable more time to it. During the months of April, May and June, I will be concentrating only on the magazine and during this time its format, its content, an increase in number of pages, its distribution, etc., will be stabilised.

Readers will note that I have not followed up in detail, on last month's "Top Ten" as indicated. Time simply "ran out" to do so. Note the Letters to the Editor page as well as page 8 for an innovative suggestion in regards to an "investment portfolio" competition.

Until the next isssue, which starts being put together tomorrow, happy collecting!

AUSTRALIAN NEWS UPDATE

TELECOM UPDATE

The following is a press release as issued by Phonecard Collector Service, Parramatta:-

"The following issues have sold out through Telecom's mail order service:-

- The single Tamworth cards
- The Limited Edition Australia Day 1994 Packs
- The Limited Edition Dinosaur Packs

There was an unprecedented demand for the Limited Edition sets and changes to the backs of the cards (making them truly limited) has proven extremely popular with Australian collectors.

At time of going to press, the cards in the Chinese Year of the Dog series were selling quickly and it looks likely they will soon sell out. Details in respect of these cards are as follows:-

- . The cards are classified as Advertising Cards, commissioned by Telecom's Corporate Marketing Department to mark the Chinese Year of the Dog.
- . There were four different card designs produced each with a face value of \$5.00.
- . There were 30,300 of each design produced (note I have had a report of a "dog" card sighted with the prefix number ending with 320 Ed.)
- . 5,000 of each design were retained for sale through Telecom's mail order service to collectors. The balance of cards were available for sale through Telecom's usual reseller network, targetting Chinese and Asian communities and areas in particular.

Delays caused by processing of the Tamworth cards has meant that Telecom has revised its policy regarding the classification and sale of Advertising cards

Advertising cards will now include Telecom Corporate Advertising (eg. Chinese Year of the Dog) and Private Advertising cards (eg. K-Mart and Castlemaine XXXX). The majority of Advertising cards will be available through Telecom's usual reseller network of Phonecards to the public and will also be offered through Telecom Collector Services.

A new classification will now be Custom cards, which will include categories such as promotional event and charity cards. This includes cards such as the recent Tamworth cards and the upcoming Swissh and Majors cards.

From this point on, the Phonecard Collectors Group will only offer Advertising cards for sale through its mail order service. <u>Custom cards will not be made available for sale through Telecom"</u>.

On querying this with Alan Dunlop from Phonecard Advertising & Collector Services (PACS) I was advised that negotiations were continuing between he and Telecom in regards to the distribution of future phonecard issues, ie., the "loose" or single units. It was not clear at time of going to print as to whether any "loose" cards for the Swissh and The Majors (Golf) series would be printed and be made available either through Telecom Collector Services or through the PACS Authorised Agents. In other words, the print run as advised for individual cards as indicated at page 11. may be reduced - Ed.

Telecom advised further that "all official issue cards will continue to be available through the mail order service. The **Coding** system for Official issues will now include the following classifications:-

N - National

L - Limited

I - International

The following codes are no longer appropriate and will not be used on official issue Phonecard:-

T - Trial

G - Generic

The Coding system regarding Custom and Advertising cards will be explained in detail in the next issue of International Phonecard News.

Telecom is currently in the process of establishing a 0055 number. The number for calls within Australia is 0055 29469. This service will provide all the news on the current Phonecard releases; what is still available and what has sold out, the latest information on upcoming Phonecard issues and serial numbers. It will be constantly updated with details for all the most recent releases and will provide the opportunity to join the Telecom Phonecard Collectors Club".

TAMWORTH CARDS

A number of the Tamworth packs (500) have now been autographed by Lee Kernaghan and are available for purchase through the PACS Authorised Dealer Network.

PLAYERS BISCUITS

This new edition features on page 11. of this issue. Note the comment on the previous page in regards to the distribution of "loose" cards, which may affect the availability of approx. 2,000 cards.

THE MAJORS (Golf Series)

At page 11., the four designs originally proposed for this issue are featured, as are the print runs and distribution outlets. Again, the final number of cards to be issued is subject to negotiations taking place. Of greater impact however, the card depicting Greg Norman, may be another "card that never was". Discussion is taking place between PACS and Telecom in regards to the final design of the phonecard. The situation will be clarified in the next issue of this magazine.

PAY TEL AUSTRALIA UPDATE

WILDERNESS RIVERS

This set of three cards which was initially called "Wild Rivers", has been renamed the "Wilderness Rivers". Pay Tel considered that the latter title was more appropriate as the folder (featured on the cover of this issue) provides details of the wilderness and World Heritage Listed areas of Sth-West Tasmania generally, not just wild rivers.

The pack is printed in full clour, both inside and outside. The cover is a photograph by Peter Dombrovski - an internationally acknowledged wilderness photographer. This photograph shows one of the famous Gordon River "Splits". Inside, a map of Tasmania details the National Park and Heritage areas. An authoritative text defines and explains the wilderness area.

The pack contains three cards of \$5.00, \$10.00 and \$20.00 denominations. These cards feature wilderness river scenes, are scanned at 300 lines/inch and are printed in full colour. The photographs are by Ted Mead, also a well known wilderness photographer. A limited edition (numbered) run of 2,500 packs will be produced. The packs will be available at \$40.00 each.

Individual cards will be available separately at face value. Card production will be as follows:-

\$5.00 10,000

\$10.00 4,000 \$20.00 3,000

Note: Above numbers include the cards in the Collector Packs.

THE MAP

This \$5.00 card features a hand drawn "Olde Worlde" map of Bass Strait, showing the route of the "Spirit of Tasmania". The card is scanned at 300 lines/inch and printed in full colour.



The card is available separately, or mounted in a full colour presentation pack. The pack features a "real" Bass Strait map, shows details of the "Spirit's" journey and provides information on the discovery, naming and some historical details of Bass Strait.

Card production numbers 10,000, whilst the presentation folders (not numbered) will total 5,000. Individual cards will be available at face value whilst the folder will retail at \$10.00.

CREW CARD

This card is a single \$10.00 card with a distinctly naval theme - printed in scarlet, navy and gold (see cover). Its usage is restricted to the crew of the "Spirit of Tasmania" for use on their own Pay Tel phone (a closed user group within a closed user group). Card production will number 10,000, all of which will be available at face value.

All of the above cards and packs will be available from your dealer or obtainable direct from Pay Tel Australia:- PO Box 456, Blackburn VIC 3130.

Pay Tel will be exhibiting at the International Phonecard Fair in Sydney at the Holiday Inn Menzies, in March, when they look forward to meeting all their existing and potential clients.

This Fair will be held in Sydney on Sunday, 20th of March, at the Holiday Inn Menzies, 14 Carrington Street, Sydney, in the Wynyard and Margaret Rooms, Lower Ground Floor. It will be open to the public from 10.00am to 5.00pm. Admission is \$2 to adults, whilst children under twelve are admitted free. All attending will have the opportunity to win a series of "lucky door prizes". Most of Australia's leading phonecard dealers will

be in attendance and already dealers from New Zealand and city, country and interstate Australia have indicated they will be attending.

Telecom Australia will have a retail stand as well as an archival exhibition. This exhibition has proved very popular at previous Fairs and will again be a feature. Telecom will have all their current phonecards available for sale plus special items for young collectors. Also available will be information and brochures about collecting Telecom Australia Phonecards.

A number of new and established dealers will be at the Fair for the first time, including Pay Tel Australia, whom will be launching their third phonecard issue as featured earlier in this article, as well as "The Map" and "Crew" cards.

Several of the Authorised Agents of Phonecard Advertising & Collector Services (PACS) will also have tables at the Fair. Collectors will be able to buy the "Tamworth Packs" and if ready, the new issue for Swissh Chocolate Bars (see page 11.)

Dealers will have a huge array of phonecards for sale. Stocks of Australian mint and used cards, collector packs, special batch and serial numbers, varieties, test cards, specimans, memorabillia, catalogues & accessories will be available for sale. There will be an excellent stock of world cards for collectors to choose from. Some dealers have

phonecards in stock from up to 140 countries. Thematic collectors should find cards covering a wide range of subjects.

Dealers at the Fair are very keen to buy both Australian and world phonecards. Many dealers will also trade in cards.

The magazines, Stamp News, The Stamp Collector and the Australian Coin Review will all have information tables at the Fair. These magazines now each include sections on phonecard collecting. Recent copies of all three magazines will be available for sale and back copies will be given away free at the Fair.

SPECIAL COLLECTOR CARDS

A Limited Edition of individually numbered Collector Cards is being produced to commemorate the Phonecard Fair, by Pay Tel Australia. They will be produced with a similar finish to previous Pay Tel cards and will include their logo on the back. 2,500 cards are being made and will be available for sale from the reception desk at the Fair from 10.00am on Sunday the 20th on a "first come first served" basis. The Collector Card will feature a panoramic view of the Sydney Opera House and the Harbour Bridge. The back will feature Pay Tel's logo and details about the card.

AUSTRALIAN INTERNATIONAL BANKNOTE FAIR

Pay Tel is also producing a Limited Edition Collector Card for the Australian International Banknote Fair, which is to be held on Saturday the 19th of March, at the same location as the Phonecard Fair the following day.

The Collector Card will feature the unique Australian one hundred pounds banknote, issued in 1914 - which sold for a record \$42,000 at Spink Noble Numismatic's public auction in 1987. Permission has been given by **Spink Noble Nunismatics Pty Ltd** to use this photograph. The card will commemorate the fifth anniversary of the Fair. A total of 1,500 individually numbered cards are being produced and will be available for sale from the reception desk at the Banknote Fair from 10.00am on the Saturday of the Fair, again on a "first come first served" basis.

This will be the first time the Fair has been held on a weekend (previously held on a Friday) and organisers are expecting a big increase in business and the number of collectors attending.

Phonecards will also be featured at the Fair as many banknote dealers now deal in phonecards as well as banknotes. Most of Australia's major banknote dealers will be attending and at least one New Zealand banknote dealer has indicated he will be coming to the Fair.

Note Printing Australia will have a special archival exhibit and members of the International Bank Note Society will participate in the IBNS competitive exhibition. The IBNS and Australian Coin Review will both have information tables at the Fair. During the past five years the Australian International Banknote Fair has established itself as Australia's major Fair for banknote collectors. This Fair should continue the tradition, especially now that it is being held on a Saturday.

BRISBANE INTERNATIONAL PHONECARD FAIR

The date and venue have now been finalised for the Brisbane International Phonecard Fair. The Fair will be held on **Sunday, the 15th of May**, at the **Brisbane City Travelodge**, in Roma Street, Brisbane. The hotel is ideally located adjacent to the Brisbane Transit Centre and is only a leisurely five minutes stroll from the city centre.

The Fair will be held in the Stradbroke Room, which is on the fifth floor. The venue is already well known to collectors as a number of other Collector Fairs have been held in the same room previously. Australia's and New Zealand's major phonecard dealers will be in attendance as will Telecom Australia. See next month's magazine for full details.



BALI CALLING

By Robert Ulseth Adelaide, S.A.

Calls Home

While travelling, those necessary telephone calls to home can have a big impact on your budget. The advent of the telephone card is helping to control those costs and of course, to telephone card collectors, the more sound reasons that we can give to friends and relatives travelling here or overseas to use telephone cards (and of course to bring them home), the better.

Calls from Bali

The following options and costs of telephone calls from the Indonesian island of Bali may help you to convince travellers in the advantage of using telephone cards. There are four ways of making telephone calls out of the island of Bali.

The **first** and possibly easiest, is to use the telephone in your hotel room. If this option is used, you are advised to take your master card when you check out of the hotel. I know of one case where three short calls (one just for a cricket score) cost \$A117. From my own experience, a local call costing 4 cents Australian at a street side coin phone, cost 50 cents from the hotel room.

The **second** option (and they do a thriving business), are privately owned telephone shops. These consist of a small shop with one or two glass booths in the shop with a telephone in each. On the wall is a price list covering nearly every country in the world with the international code and price per minute displayed. An agreed length of conversation is costed, then as soon as you say "hello", a stop watch is put in front of you and you must hang up before the agreed time limit. The cost of a three minute call was \$A17.85.

At the Telekom office in Dempesar there are some reverse charge telephones, which is the **third** option. There are eighteen countries listed by number, 01 to 18 and by pressing the

appropriate button you will automatically be connected to the operator in that country.

The fourth option is the one that we are most interested in - Telephone cards. Major hotels, large department stores and the Telekom office in Dempesar are the locations of card phones. Only one was seen in the streets of Dempesar. On first view it appears (to an Australian) that the phone is not working as the instruction screen is blank. When the hand-piece is lifted however, the screen lights up pale green, with the instructions in both Indonesian and English. The cost for a three minute call to Australia was \$A10.61 using a local phonecard.

Price of Phonecards

One thing about purchasing phonecards, some resellers (mostly hotels and small shops), mark up the price 10% to 15% above face value, at the same time using a black felt pen to cover the original price and thereby ruining a new phonecard.

The Telekom office in Dempesar and the major department stores charge face value and do not mark the cards in any way.

OVERPRINTS

First Overprints April 1992

The first overprinted New Zealand phonecard was arranged by Steve McLachlan of Shades Stamp Shop, in Christchurch, when 1,000 of the \$5.00 Okarito Lagoon cards (1991 Landscape Series) were produced and distributed to collectors at the first Anzac Day Phonecard Fair in 1992, thus establishing a practice which is still continuing.

Since then, many producers have joined in as overprinted phonecards are, for the most part, cheap to buy, fun to produce and fun to collect by those interested in this specific area.

Over print Catalogue

Ray Dobson from Christchurch, has compiled a Catalogue which lists and illustrates phonecards overprinted in New Zealand up until the end of 1993. Its main reason for publication is to record for posterity, overprints that have been produced, so that collectors will be able to identify cards already in their collections, or cards which they may wish to collect.

Overseas Cards

Phonecards from Australia, Singapore and the United Kingdom have also been listed, together with New Zealand cards. These overseas cards have all been overprinted in Christchurch and thus have been included. As far as possible, cards have been grouped together with similar type cards and no effort has been made to list cards in chronological order.

The print run of each overprint is included in the catalogue as is the issue price and an estimation of each card's present value.

Wide Variety

Cards featured include the promotion of companies, eg Hertz, sporting events, eg.,1993 Lions Tour of New Zealand, America's Cup Challenge, the Melbourne Cup, various Expos, eg., Northpex Stampshow, etc.

Catalogue Overprint

Ray Dobson has in fact produced 350 overprints promoting the sale of his catalogue which was released on the 29th of December, 1993. The overprinted (used) phonecard features the 1992, \$10.00 Hockey card from

the Winter Sports Series, which has been overprinted as follows:-



The card is issued free of charge together with each catalogue purchased, which is priced at NZ \$7.50.

SMALL BUSINESS

PHONECARD DEALERS & TRADERS

Any person's conducting a business have certain obligations to comply with under Commonwealth and/or State Legislation and/or Local Government Authority Rules and By-Laws. Such Legislation, By-Laws, etc., varies from State to State to Territory, but all have in common certain principles which must be adhered to so as a business can operate and remain within the law. This article is focussed on requirements (licences, permits and approvals) faced by phonecard "dealers" or "traders", both common in principle as well as specific by localised Legislation, etc. It should be stressed, that this article is not an authority on the matter, in fact the more I delved, the more complex and, in fact, draconian the issue became. It is strongly recommended that persons wishing to clarify their own specific set of circumstances, seek advice from, initially, their respective State Business Licence Information Centre. - Editor.

BUSINESS NAME APPLICATION

Business Names Legislation in each State requires the registration of a name if a person or persons (incorporated or not) wish to carry on business under a business name which is not their usual name, eg Durrant House Collectables as opposed to my own name, ie., Viddy Jermacans Collectables/Phonecards.

Each State and Territory has its own Business Name Legislation. Names which require registration must be registered in each State or Territory in which business is carried out. In other words, if a business is registered in NSW and wishes to operate interstate, even for a weekend at a Fair, Show, etc., it technically must be registered in that state. Any one operating under a name other than their own whom "follows" the Stamp, Coin and Phonecard Fair circuit must be registered in each state, under one of possibly three methods, ie., as a resident business, using a Resident Agent or by utilising the Mutual Recognition Act.

The purpose of registration is to protect the public by providing a public register from which the identity of persons who conduct businesses under names other than their own names may be established. It is not for the purpose of protecting names or conferring rights to use names. This public register is available for inspection should anyone wish to ascertain the identity of the principles of a business.

Under the respective State Business Names Acts, each Business Name must have a registered address situated in the relevant state.

Post office box numbers will not be accepted as a business address.

Using NSW as an example, where all the applicants are individuals and all reside outside the state, a

person who is resident in NSW must be appointed as Resident Agent and for this purpose, an Appointment of Resident Agent form should be completed and lodged together with the Application for Registration of a Business Name.

Alternatively, a business registered in a particular state wishing to carry out its business in another, can apply for registration in that other state/s, for a period not exceeding one month, under the relevant clause of the Mutual Recognition Act.

In all cases, for Registration of a Business to remain current, it must be **renewed periodically**; in some states yearly, in others three yearly, before the anniversary of the registration date.

Associated with all legislative requirements are penalties for non compliance. Again referring to NSW, penalties under the Business Names (Amendments) Act, 1989, have been substantially increased to achieve maximum compliance with the Act. The Act now provides for;

- . a penalty of \$5,000 for failing to register a name in use or carrying on business under a name (other than the proprietor's own name) without having the business name registered.
- . a penalty of \$2,000 for non-disclosure including non-exhibition of a business name and certificate at the place of business (be the place of business permanent or "for a weekend").

Of note, is the fact that the business name must appear in legible characters on all letters, statements of account, invoices, official notices, publications, orders and receipts.

The cost for applying to register a business name varies from state to state, eg. New South Wales \$75.00, Western Australia \$82.00, Queensland \$82.00, Victoria (max of) \$100, etc.

SECOND HAND DEALERS LICENCE COLLECTORS LICENCE

A Second Hand Dealer means any person who carries on the business of dealing in or buying or selling second hand goods, whether such person deals in any other goods or not. In most states, the term dealer includes "entrepreneur", which means the person in charge of and responsible for the running of;

- . a trash & treasure market
- . a flea market
- . an antique market
- . an antique fair.

Collector means any person engaged in collecting second hand goods, whether on his/her own or on behalf of an employer, for the purpose of sale or trade, but shall not include a person who buys second hand goods at a bona fide advertised auction sale conducted by a licenced auctioneer.

Most states have comparative legislation in regards to regulations governing Second Hand Dealers and Collectors, eg., NSW has the Second Hand Dealers and Collectors Act (1906), Queensland the Second Hand Dealers and Collectors Act (1984-1985), WA the Second Hand Dealers Act (1906), etc.

Licences may be issued to an individual or a corporation. If you intend to trade as a partnership, the licence will only be issued to one nominated partner. Only one licence may be issued for any one premises, although a person may hold several licences at various locations. Where a business is operated under a Business Name (which must be registered), the licence will be issued to the registered holder of the Business Name. This may be an individual or a Corporation.

The administering agency for the issue of licences varies. In Queensland it is the Department of Police, ie., application forms are submitted to the local Police Station, in WA, forms are submitted with the Clerk of Courts "nearest to where the applicant proposes to carry on his/her business", etc.

Fees again vary, eg., NSW \$30 for a Dealer Licence and \$14 for a Collectors, Tasmania \$10 for a Dealers Licence, Qld \$183.10 for a Dealers Licence and \$38.70 for a Collectors Licence, etc.

Again, the Mutual Recognition Act can be utilised in regards to dealing and collecting interstate.

There are certain goods exempted for which a Licence is not required to deal with and/or collect. Of interest in Queensland, is that stamps and coins are exempted as second hand goods. This is the only state where I was able to ascertain such an exemption exists. Phonecards are not exempt in any states.

MARKET ENDORSEMENT EXHIBITION LICENCE

Market Endorsement will authorise the holder of a current second hand dealers licence to carry on

his/her business of a second hand dealer at the market specified, on days and time specified. A separate application form is required for each market you intend to trade at.

An Exhibition Licence will authorise the holder of a current second hand dealers licence to carry on his/her business of a second hand dealer at exhibitions, fairs or other functions. The licence is in force for the duration of exhibition on dates and during the hours as specified in the licence.

As above, Queensland legislation allows exemption from requiring such licences, to those dealing in coins and stamps. Again, no state gives exemption to phonecard dealers.

In NSW, licence applications must be lodged with the Clerk of the Local Court "nearest to the nominated trading address".

REGISTERS

Second Hand Dealers and Collectors are required to hold "appropriate registers". Check with the local governing authority (usually Police or Clerk Of Courts) to ascertain what the term "appropriate" refers to.

In summary, if a phonecard dealer wishes to operate and function within one state, whilst he/she requires a minimum of two licences (Second Hand Dealer & Collector), the number of licences required increase, if the business is operating under a name other than that of the principal and if the business wishes to operate at Fairs, Shows, Exhibitions, etc.

If the business wishes to operate and function interstate, the situation becomes quite complex, time consuming and no doubt frustrating.

When I explained the various scenarios faced by (travelling) dealers to those providing information, many sympathised that whilst the "red tape" was enormous in regards to licencing activities from state to state (and it was almost worth the risk to "duck across the border for a weekend"), the bottom line is that the various forms of licencing are required by law.

As indicated at the introduction to this article, check with your local Business Licence Information Centre to ascertain your obligations & requirements.

VARIATIONS & FAULTS

CAN THEY BE EXPLAINED?

Over the last few months, readers have submitted numerous <u>examples of variations</u> to the size and shape of <u>serial numbers</u>, to the diameter and colouring of the <u>Telecom Logo</u> and to the length and colouring of the insertion <u>directional arrow</u>. Examples have also been provided of encoding errors, missing Copyrights, etc.

The following is a cross section of some of the variations, faults and plain anomolies, as identified by readers of the magazine.

IDENTICAL NUMBERS

Noel Palmer from Grange in Queensland is the very lucky holder of two \$10, 1993 Christmas Cards (N931123a), with identical numbering. Both cards are used (a two hole and a three hole). Below are enlarged reproductions of the two sets of numbers. Can you pick a difference?

0035345597

The implications of finding two cards with identical numbering are very interesting. Is this a "one off" or are there 100,000 cards printed with an identical twin?

0000000000000

Steve Stephanos from the Adelaide Phonecard Centre, will have on display a Mint \$5 Generic (TC1) phonecard, at the Sydney International Phonecard Fair. This card contains the serial number 00000000000000 (13 zeros). Visit Steve's table and ask to look at the card.

THE MOVING V

Mrs. Coral Wilcox from South Australia has provided examples of a number of anomalies. Firstly, you will note in the reproduction of the Page 20 — Phonecard Monthly

reverse of two consecutively numbered, \$5, 1994 Australia Day cards (N931212), numbers which have a v which has moved a digit to the left from one card to the next, ie., firstly located over the 8 then over the 6. Note also, the appearance of a second v above the two in the second card.

SMALL & LARGE NUMERALS

Further, Mrs Wilcox has provided the following examples of small and large serial numerals within a particular batch run. This appears to be quite a common occurrence as many readers have submitted examples.

You will note on the card, 34227353, the appearance of the double v again, above the numbers 22.

<u>Leo McHugh</u> from Victoria has queried the possible end number of a run of small numerals and the commencement of the large numerals for a particular batch of the \$5 Christmas card. The cards he has, show a small set of numbers as 35602723 and large as 35616400 (sorry- no reproduction of cards).

Of interest, is the point that where differences occur, the batch numbers always seem to start with the smaller numerals and increase in size, not the reverse. Does this have something to do with the machinery or the ink getting

"hotter" through use and therefore expanding in size or spread?

ENCODING ERRORS

\$2.00 OLYMPIC

John Ayres from Tasmania reports, that whilst checking through his mint \$2.00 Olympic phonecards, he found one with an encoding error. Instead of being worth \$2.10 it is encoded with an amount of \$5.40 (prefix number 14929474). He would be interested in hearing if anyone else has one, as he is aware that a small amount of the \$5.00 Olympic Swimming were encoded with \$2.10 instead of \$5.40 (see below).

\$5.00 OLYMPIC SWIMMING

The following is an extract from a letter received from Eric Schuenemann from Victoria, relating to the 182 Encoding Error.

"In the September and November issues of Stamp News, Ian Robson of NSW reported on a number of 182, \$5 Swimming Cards that were incorrectly encoded by Telecom (in Japan) with only \$2.10 (no visual difference). He reported the serial number span as being between 18234399-18234508. Sixteen cards were estimated to exist in mint form. As I was the one to originally discover these cards in a Newsagency, I can confidently say that the serial span is 18234399-18234520. There are 34 mint cards, the 35th being used by myself to test behaviour.

This error seems to correspond with the 149 Hockey encoding error. These eleven hole cards were probably encoded with \$5.40 (see above story). How this occurred would make an interesting story. If you the collector own a mint 149 Hockey, try checking its value in a pre-tested phone. Needless to say it would be a rarity indeed, if it shows up as \$5.40.

I am interested in collector comments regarding the value of the 182 error. I have been selling them or exchanging them at \$150-\$200. Editors comments welcome."

This question is asked continually of me in regards to a number of "mistakes", etc. I can only say that its worth "whatever someone is prepared to pay for it" and the only way to find the answer to this question, is to sell by tender or auction, ie., seek offers. - Ed.

Mr Schuenemann goes on to say, " that collectors need to be aware of serial number varieties. Most will be aware of the 300, \$10 Generic that comes in small and medium size

serial numbering. There are a number of card prefixes in the range between 333 to 351 that contain two to three different prefix sizes. There seems to be a definite changeover point in the serial number runs that I have observed. Some are quite short (between 10 to 25 thousand) and will be very scarce in mint form. I am still compiling a list of varieties and will be more specific in a future article."

COPYRIGHT

<u>Chas Naylor</u> from NSW offers the following information on the missing Copyright.

"I have noticed that the word Copyright is missing on only some of the \$20 Great Barrier Reef Cards with the old logo in the new Generic series. The numbers I have without the

word are:- 25182195

25197214

25213929

25565814

25622207

Other prefixes in the same series do have the word Copyright included. I wonder if there were cards printed in the above number series with Copyright included"?

SHOOTING STAR

Laurie Brown from Queensland, has a \$5.00, 1993 Christmas card, with two small lines directly above the dip in the mountains behind the horse. It looks like a shooting star. The serial number on the card is 35913685. He would be interested to hear if anyone has numbers either side of this card with similar features, to see if it is a variety.

MISSING SERIAL NUMBER

<u>Don Hill</u> from Victoria reports the discovery of another card with a missing serial number. It was found in an unopened batch from a retail outlet and so its number can be "guessed" as 24933247. It is a \$10 Environmental Danger.

A WORLD VIEW

Part 4. KUWAIT

From **INTERCARDS**By Peter Granfield

The issue and use of phonecards in Kuwait has been rather interesting and varied, aided by an interruption of war.

The Ministry of Communications (MOC) commenced their payphone system on the 1st of May 1987, with an experimental use of a small number of payphones installed at the Telecommunications Centre in Kuwait City and capable of calling internationally.

The payphones were made by Autelca and as was the practice, the company supplied their standard Testcard for a few months use. See an article in the February issue of this magazine for details on the Testcards. These Testcards were replaced by the first MOC cards (illus. 1) in values of Kuwaiti Dinar (KD) 3, 5 and 10.

In 1989, some more of these payphones were installed in other locations. Testcards are virtually impossible to get at any price, whilst the set of three MOC cards sell for \$675 used.

Prior to the invasion by the Iraqis in August 1990 and for a short time after, a further trial was made, this time using phonecards manufactured by Tamura of Japan (illus. 2a-2c) These cards were in the same values as the Autelca cards. The cards were only in use for a short time before many of the phones were destroyed by the Iraqis when the liberation of Kuwait took place. The set of three of these were selling for \$450 used, prior to later occurrences.

Post Invasion

On the 26th of February 1991, the MOC issued contracts with GPT and Cable and Wireless, to provide a nation wide payphone service, replacing those destroyed, as well as the existing Autelca payphones. Mercurycards with several different Kuwaiti designs (illus. 3) were

temporarily used after the liberation and were supplied by Cable and Wireless until the 24th of March 1992, when they became invalid and were replaced by GPT cards issued by the MOC (illus. 4).

During this period, Mercurycards of Britain were made available to employees of this company, to Cable and Wireless and to servicemen and women whom were working in the Gulf. Some of these cards bearing the words "H.M. Forces in the Gulf" and being sponsored by Mercury, Cable and Wireless, British Aerospace and Natwest.

You might think these cards would be scarce, but in fact had issued quantities between 15,000 and 50,000 of each. These and other British cards were valid for use in both Kuwait and Britain and can be found listed in catalogues as British cards. The Kuwait Mercurycards sell for \$5 to \$170 used, depending upon the card.

Advertising Cards

The MOC now issues new cards on a regular basis (illus. 5) and has also commenced the issue of advertising cards. Some of the advertisers have included:-

Kuwaiti Airways, BMW, and Banks, as well as oil, beverage, suitcase and glass companies.

These advertising cards all have an issue quantity of only 10,000 and market prices on the early ones have already risen to around \$80 used (illus, 6 & 7).

Equipment Returned

Under the United Nations ceasefire terms, Iraq was compelled to return equipment and materials looted during the occupation. In early September 1993, several container loads of MOC equipment were returned, including Tamura payphones and a large quantity of Tamura phonecards. On the 1st of October 1993, five Tamura payphones were reinstalled in the Ministry building (alongside the GPT ones) to use up the returned Tamura phonecards. Of these post invasion cards, only a few KD3 and KD5 and even less KD10, seem to have been sold, before a new set of Tamura cards came on sale (illus. 8-10). It would appear that these were prepared for issue prior to the invasion.

Prices on the post invasion KD3 and KD5 cards have naturally dropped considerably, but with very few KD10 cards still available, it appears the value of the set is likely to remain at a resonably high level.



The OPTUS CALLING CARD

by Cyril Fox

Awareness?

Many collectors would still not be aware of the OPTUS phonecard which OPTUS calls the "Calling Card" (see front cover-Ed.).

The OPTUS Calling Card is a charge card which bills your calls to your residential or business, OPTUS Long Distance Account. Unlike Telecom's Phonecards, the Calling Card is not a prepaid card - calls are billed as they are made. The Card can also be used indefinitely. Since the card is not inserted into the payphone mechanism, the condition of it is unaffected by continual use.

Where Can It Be Used?

The Calling Card can be used from most residential or business telephones, most Telecom payphones and most touchtone phones in selected overseas countries. The Card cannot be used from Telecom creditphones. Local calls can be made using the Card, provided that the area code is included in the number dialled.

Overseas Calls

Calls from overseas are currently limited to the "Call-Home Australia" facility. In other words, you can call Australia from overseas, but you cannot (yet) call from one overseas country to another, eg., France to Germany. I'm told that it is likely that sometime in the future, there will be a facility to call from one overseas country to another. The "Call Home Australia" service is currently available in Germany, Hong Kong, New Zealand, the United Kingdom (using either Mercury or British Telecom), the U.S.A. (using AT & T, MCI or Sprint), Canada (using Teleglobe), France, Indonesia (using Indosat), Korea, Taiwan and Japan (using KDD or IDC but unavailable with Nippon Telephone). OPTUS is in the process of negotiating for access in Singapore and the Philippines.

How is the Calling Card Used?

In Australia you dial 1812 for access, enter your card number and PIN, then enter the area code and phone number you want to call. From overseas you are required to dial a special "Call Home Australia" number.



Reverse Of Card

It is possible to register up to five numbers for speed dialling. Call access can be limited to specific numbers, to Australia only calls or access may be unrestricted. For example, if you give your children Calling Cards, you may wish to limit access or you may receive a terrible shock when get your OPTUS account and find out that the little darlings have been calling Canada, Ireland and Somalia.

Costs & Charges

The Calling Card is issued free of charge by OPTUS. It is not a requirement for you to have selected OPTUS for your long distance calls; OPTUS however, will need to be satisfied of your credit worthiness.

Calls are charged at the normal OPTUS Tariffs (off peak/peak rates depending on the time of the call) plus a 50 cents per call surcharge. Unfortunately, this more than doubles the cost of a local call!

When calling from overseas using the OPTUS Card, Australian tariffs apply based on the time in Australia. So, calling from say, New York at midnight, would be a peak rate call because it is mid-afternoon in Australia.

Versatile & Convenient

Theres no doubt that the OPTUS Calling Card is both versatile and convenient and that it would make a usefull addition to your wallet or purse, but keep a Telecom Phonecard handy for your local calls.



"News From the Melbourne Phonecard Club"

About forty keen phonecard collectors gathered in the Northcote Library Community Room on Thursday, 20th of January, when the Club played host for the evening to Emma Rogers, Public Relations and Advertising Manager for the Phonecard Collector Service of Telecom's Payphone Services in Parramatta, NSW.

Emma displayed some phonecard related material from the Telecom Archives, including proofs from the Canberra set, the Quoll (the phonecard that never was) and the Tamworth cards; artwork for the BP and Mobil speciman cards and various artists' ideas for the Barcelona Olympic cards and collector packs. Several members expressed their appreciation at being able to see this material at close quarters, stating that it helped them to better visualise the various stages involved in phonecard design and production.

Emma also talked about Telecom's increase in production of advertising cards and the increase in cost of the new limited edition collector packs. She stated that over the last three years, Telecom has been carefully monitoring developments in the world phonecard market and the reaction to advertising cards, of collectors in key foreign countries.

Telecom believes that up until recently, phonecard collecting in Australia has lacked the zest and sparkle of countries such as Germany, France and Japan (although she stressed that Japan is unique).

Telecom is hopeful that the increase in production of advertising cards will provide the stimulation and challenge that it believes has so far been missing in the Australian phonecard market.

Telecom plans to produce six or seven official issues every year. However, the print runs for each issue will be significantly reduced due to the increase in the number of advertising cards that will be produced.

It is envisaged that Telecom will release around two advertising cards every month, which it is hoped, will add excitement and greater diversity to the hobby and provide an alternative to collecting by serial number, to Australian collectors who are looking for a challenge.

In addition to the Chinese Year of the Dog cards released in February, Telecom Corporate Marketing will be commissioning cards featuring the Australian Ballet and the Sydney Dance Company.

National issues for the next twelve months include a second set of of Endangered Species, Commonwealth Games and a new series of cards featuring landscaped designs to replace the Australiana generics.

Emma also spoke about the increase in cost of Collector Packs. She stressed that collectors will not be paying a premium on the packs, that is, Telecom is not making any money out of increasing its prices on packs but rather it is ensuring that it does not lose any money. There are many costs involved in the production of Limited Edition Collector Packs, she said and they all add up to making a pack expensive.

Emma spent about half an hour answering questions from the floor and concluded by presenting the Club with a gift of several of the more recent Collector Packs and some small posters advertising the Dinosaur cards.

Members then spent some time exchanging cards and partaking of a supper which was provided for the Club by Barbara and Tim Hore. All agreed it was a very enjoyable and informative evening.

The advertising of our Club in your magazine under the "Club & Society Display Ads" has been highly successfull. At a recent meeting, we had an attendance of **seventy enthusiastic collectors**, many of whom attended for the first time, having found out about the Club from reading your magazine, "The Australasian Phonecard Monthly". The Melbourne Phonecard Club Inc. fully supports your magazine and we have promoted it in our Newsletter under the paragraph of "A Recommendation", - a copy is enclosed.

Dear Sir,

Dog gone it! Where do you get it and so on? These could be a couple of the statements made, plus others that cannot be mentioned in print, about the "Year of the Dog" phonecards. I found out about this issue (4 x \$5 cards) by pure chance and was told that my best chance to obtain these phonecards was down in "Chinatown" (Melbourne). Great, so off I marched and went to the Telecom shop opposite "Chinatown" and was told they had never heard of this issue. I then went to other outlets that sold phonecards and my enquiries were answered with replies of, "no, we don't have them", "yes, we did have them but we have now sold out" and "we didn't have many to start with".

The biggest dissapointment however, and I feel was a big NO-NO, was from one agent who said that he had them but his boss had sold them at 50% above the retail price and was keeping the rest to sell at a later date when he found out what the real market value was! I eventually found a dealer who had stock and I bought a set at 100% markup. What choice did I have if I wanted my collection to be complete?

I make the following points (as **constructive criticism** only):-

1. Telecom should have a policy that there be a list of dates and types of issues of phonecards in advance, so

that collectors and dealers can be alerted to purchasing the issues as they become available.

- 2. Retail outlets get a supply of special cards **only** when collectors and dealers have had a chance to obtain cards. If there are no cards left, it will not matter as these agents will still be selling everyday phonecards to the general public (not interested in collecting) and will not be profiteering.
- 3. Telecom should have a major outlet shop in every capital city where issues can be purchased personally. At the moment, it takes 4-6 weeks by post from Parramatta and you are not sure if your purchase is filled and prices released can skyrocket whilst one is waiting to receive an order.

I think that every collector would sympathise with the frustration indicated by this writer. All involved in collecting and dealing with phonecards would no doubt support the above recommendations, particularly the first and third. I recently returned from holiday to discover Telecom's latest order form had arrived with details about the Australia Day and Dinosaur packs. I sent my order form off and after waiting several weeks, I discovered that they were all sold out and that many others also had missed out. I still do not know if I will receive my order or not. I decided to ring Telecom and after hearing their side of the story, I cooled down somewhat. It appears that they were not expecting the deluge of interest for these packs and now they are snowed under with extra work! I rang up several dealers and found prices quoted were already two to three times issue price. I just feel that I should have had the chance to obtain these cards at issue price! H.S. VIC.

Dear Sir,

I have conceived what I think could be an interesting scenario for an "investment game" between yourself (with your \$1000 portfolio) and interested dealers and collectors. If a number of dealers and collectors are willing to take the challenge of a friendly competition, each with a \$1,000 phonecard portfolio and compare results, say one year hence, the results should be most enlightening! To determine the final portfolio values, each player would have to liquidate after one year, preferably through your magazine and a disinterested arbiter appointed to call the results! What do you think? Would the "big boys" come to the party - or would they duck for cover?


