EDITORIAL

Subscribers and dealers will have received this magazine a 'few' days later than 'normal'. My apologies for this but my trip to Hong Hong (see page 16), together with the public holiday here in NSW on Monday 2 October, led to this state of affairs.

Readers will note in this issue, a reasonable amount of material focussing on Asian phonecards, fairs and exhibitions.

Page 2 — Phonecard Monthly

August and September appear to be the 'fair/exhibition months' as far as the Asian countries are concerned, with major phonecard events being held in Singapore, Hong Kong, and Beijing, whilst stamp shows were prominent in Indonesia and Thailand.

Of note, appears to be the interest being displayed by phonecard dealers in attending these fairs. A total of five Australian dealers/card producers (plus Telstra) had stands at Singapore '95 in August, whilst three attended the Hong Kong Exhibition.

The same weekend as Hong Kong was being held, Australian dealers were in attendance at a show in Beijing.

There are a number of positives in this. Obviously (and importantly), Australian phonecards are on show in other countries, thereby increasing their exposure for sale to the collectors from those countries.

As well as purchases being made at such shows, dealers have the potential to continue with on-going sales to clients introduced to their cards.

The sale of cards 'out of Australia' decreases excess stock being held in this country, with a consequent, gradual increase in demand over supply, which increases the value of cards remaining.

I think it is obvious to all that the 'collector type' print runs of Telstra Phonecards have, to date, far exceeded the local collector demand.

Dealers generate additional income through increased sales. After costs, a fair percentage of the income generated is 'put back' into the purchase of further stock, both whilst away overseas and through follow-up with contacts established whilst visiting other countries.

The stock from these countries is then made available to collectors in Australia, thereby broadening both existing collector interest as well as attracting additional collectors with, in particular, attractive thematic subject phonecards. The variety and range of themes covered by phonecards being produced in many of the Asian countries is amazing and truly a thematic collector's delight.

Whilst the number of members of the public attending fairs in countries such as Hong Kong, Singapore and Japan, far exceeds the numbers attending comparative fairs and shows in this country, the cumulative expense of airfares, accomodation costs and table hire can be quite inhibiting when one is planning to travel to participate in an overseas fair.

For example, I received some figures this week for a fair to be held in Tokyo in December, where the 'set up fee' is 200,000 Yen (or, in less scary terms A\$3,380).

So, it is quite a risk that a dealer can take when deciding to participate in an overseas fare. Whilst the rewards can be satisfactory, a bad turn-out from the public, taking the wrong stock, not being able to communicate with local clients (very important), etc. can lead to dissapointment.

However, by what I viewed in Hong Kong and from feedback from the dealers, the Asian collector scene appears strong which, indirectly, augers well for collectors in this country.







AUSTRALIAN NEWS UPDATE

'COCKIE' WINS FOR TELSTRA

An Australian Phonecard has achieved international recognition in a telephone card design competition.

Competing against hundreds of designs from around the world, a Telstra Phonecard was judged to be the "Best Overall Card". The \$5 card was produced specially to commemorate five years of Phonecard in Australia.

The award was announced in Maastricht, the Netherlands, at CardEx '95, a major international telephone card convention.

Telstra's winning entry is a tongue-in-cheek design featuring one of Australia's most loved emblems, the 'cockie', sporting five birthday candles incorporated in its plumage (issued late last year).

The CardEx award aims to highlight and publicly recognise the best achievments in card design. The "Best Overall Card Design", won by Telstra, is granted to the company which has issued the most attractive, beautiful or striking of those entered.

Nelda Slezak, National Manager, Telstra Phonecard Collector Service, was in Maastricht to receive the award and said Australian cards are extremely popular in the international collector market.

"The 'Cockie card' in particular has been extremely popular with collectors both in Australia and internationally since its release last December," said Ms Slezak

"This award will serve to make it even more sought after".

"Australian Phonecards have experienced an international surge in popularity because of the high quality and creativity of card design. Many designs released by Telstra have been world firsts and Australia is one of the few countries to utilise leading edge magnetic technology to produce high resolution graphics".

QANTAS 75TH ANNIVERSARY

Telstra and Qantas are releasing a series of **eight (8) phonecards** from 1 November 1995 to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of the airline.

The cards will be distributed through Telstra phonecard retailers throughout Australia. As these are a General **Advertising** phonecard they should also be available through Phonecard Collector Services.

There will be 5 x \$5, 2 x \$10 and 1 x \$20 phonecards in the set and they feature different aircraft which have been used by Qantas - from the Avro of the 1920's, the Super Constellation of the 1950's to the latest 747-400 Longreach. The distinctly painted Wunala Dreaming 747-400 is also featured (see cover).

In addition, Qantas and Phonecard Advertising & Collector Services (PACS) are putting together a Limited Edition set which will contain the first 3,000 phonecards

of each design. These will be assembled so that all serial numbers in the first 3,000 **will match**. This series will be offered to Qantas Club & Frequent Flyer Members throughout October and November.

This will undoubtably be a highly desirable set, sought by both users of the airline and phonecard collectors. **One to try and obtain!**

The promotion commences on 1 October 1995 - so keep your eyes open!

VISA STORED VALUE CARDS

Featured on the opposite page are the images of the first stored value smart cards to be used by an international card issuer in Australia and amongst the first in the world.

As readers will be aware from articles in the last two issues of this magazine trials by Visa and Mastercard have been underway for some time now for the introduction of multi-purpose smart cards - one purpose of which will be for use in making phonecalls from Telstra's payphones.

Pre-trial Card

The cards at the top of the strip (front and back) is the card used to demonstrate the stored value technology at Australian media and industry conferences.

It was first used at a Visa media conference on March 24, 1995 at the NSW Art Gallery in Sydney, where the NSW Minister for Community Services, Jim Longley and Hilton Sack, Executive Vice President of Visa International, Australia and New Zealand, used them to purchase goods from a vending machine.

The pre-trial card has no denomination printed on it, but holds \$20 of value. The card has a different security access code to the trial cards and cannot be used in the trials or the pilot.

Trial Cards ANZ, NAB & CUSCAL (\$5 & \$20)

The Visa international pilot went live with the bank trial stage, Phase 0, on August 2, 1995, when the ANZ Bank issued \$5 and \$20 cards to staff for use in their in-house cafeteria in Melbourne.

The NAB trials began hot on their heels, when on August 7, 1995, \$5 and \$20 cards were issued to bank staff in the NAB cafeterias and retail shops in the Melbourne head office.

On September 6, 1995, CUSCAL began their trial at Cafe on Druitt in Sydney. \$5 cards were given to staff and guests and \$20 cards were sold in the cafe.

This was the first publicly available open-system stored value card in Australia and the first publicly available Visa stored value card in the world.

As an aside, when I 'dropped' into the Cafe to collect some cards, I noticed a rubbish bin with a number of packs/folders in it. These had contained the cards when issued to CUSCAL staff.

It was the first time that I had 'dived' into a rubbish bin since my (poor) student days!

All the trial cards are open system cards, meaning that cards issued by one institution can be used anywhere in the program. For example, when in Sydney, an NAB cardholder can use their card at Cafe on Druitt, the CUSCAL trial site.

Westpac and CBA cards will be issued in the near future.

I'll leave it up to you to try and work out the reasons for the volume numbers as opposed to denomination, eg, why is the CUSCAL issue the reverse of the two banks?

PAYTEL AUSTRALIA

On page 8, readers will note the images of the latest releases from PayTel.

Firstly, PayTel's satellite payphones operate through the **Optus "B" satellite** depiced on the \$10 phonecard. The image - courtesy Optus Communications Pty Ltd - shows the satellite coverage which extends across the whole of Australia and 200 km out to see.

This card has a **Special Purpose** designation so no collector pack will be issued. A satellite information card is available with each card purchase.

Secondly, PayTel has issued its 'Tasmanian Wildflowers' set of three cards. The flowering plants depicted on the three cards and on PayTel's Collector Pack are endemic to Tasmania.

Amongst them are: (\$5 card) Heart Berries, Mountain Currant Bush, Cheese Berries, Celery Top Pine and Native Solomon's Seal: (\$10 card) Leatherwood and Page 10 — Phonecard Monthly

Climbing Heath; (\$20 card) Deciduous Beach and Snowberry. Waratah (Telopea truncata) is portrayed on the Collector's Pack.

The cards and pack all feature original paintings by noted Hobart botanical artist Nell Frankcombe.

ROAM PACIFIC

Jacob Wolfowicz advises of the release of ROAM'S cobranded Limited Edition of **Comstar Russia** phonecards, issued to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Allied victory in WW II.

The **three cards** (see inside back cover) are contained in a Collector Pack with text in both Russian and English. The text is accompanied by photos.

A total of 900 international sets have been printed, with only 250 sets being made available for sale in Australia through ROAM.

The Collector Packs are available at \$150.00 each, with the first 100 orders receiving a free \$5.00 Australian War Memorial card.

ROAM AUST. P/L V TELSTRA CORPORATION

The third hearing in the above legal battle between Roam Australia and Telstra Corporation took place in Court 20E of the Federal Court of Australia, in Sydney, on Friday the 8th of September.

Roam Australia is seeking significant damages ("millions of dollars") from Telstra. It is suing for loss of business, breach of contract and a number of other breaches of the Trade Practices Act.

The focus of the suit is the **Australian War Memorial** \$5 **phonecard**, which Roam claims was incorrectly released by Telstra as a general issue phonecard and not with Roam's logo inscribed.

The hearing on the 8th of September was the third such hearing.

Basically, Roam has filed a number of claims against Telstra. Telstra has filed a cross claim against Roam, indicating also that Roam's original claims are 'very broad' and 'not clear'.

After listening to the legal representation for both parties, Justice Lockhart ordered that both parties comply with the following:-

That by Monday 25 September:

Roam Pacific provide a document to Telstra which clearly outlines its claims against that Corporation. That by Monday the 9th of October:

Telstra Corporation responds to the claims in writing.

Both documents are to be lodged with the Court.

Justice Lockhart also ordered that the legal advisors for the two parties meet within 14 days of the 9th of October to agree to the issues at hand and the form that the evidence relevant to the claims should take at the next hearing, which has been set down for the 17th of November.

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



INDIAN MOTORCYCLE PHONECARDS

For over 50 years, the Indian Motorcycle company dominated an era of motorcycle manufacturing. The first mass producer of motorcycles in the United States, Indian Motorcycle's factory was established in Springfield, Massachusetts at the turn of the century. During the First World War, the American military used

During the First World War, the American military used 70,000 motorcycles, of which some 40,000 were Indian Motorcycles.


When the Indian Motorcycle factory suspended operations in 1953, it was the end of a special era in motorcycle manufacturing.

After a 40 year hiatus, the plant re-opened in 1993 and bikes again began to roll off the production line in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Indian Motorcycle Phonecards

With the re-emergence of the Indian motorcycle, came the introduction of a series in phonecards which feature the famous motorcycle classics.

The first 2-card set was issued in early 1994 by The Collectors Advantage. The first card contains a hologram of the Indian Motorcycle logo and is entitled, "The Indian is Back". The second card carries a photograph of the 1993 Indian Chief motorcycle in brilliant red.



Following the success of the release of these two cards, The Collectors Advantage followed up with a further two releases, the second of which featured five motorcycles built between 1924 and 1952 and the third which featured three motorcycles built in 1940 and 1941.

New Licensee

It appears that the licensing rights for the re-production of Indian Motorcycle images went to ATX American Telecard, as the fourth set of two phonecards (featuring a 1931 "101" Indian Scout and a Hologram card), were released by this company.

ATX American Telecard is a Delaware Corporation with its principal place of business located in New York.

In the past two years, American Telecard has produced and marketed a number of licensed images on pre-paid calling cards. These images are marketed to the international phonecard collectors as well as dealers and distributors in the U.S., Europe and Australia.

Cowley's Motorcycles

Cowley's Motorcycles & Collectibles, in Port Lincoln, South Australia, has been distributing Indian phonecards for the last 12 months. Ashley Cowley advises that he still has some of series II, III and IV available.


Cowley's also deal in Indian collector cards as well as anything collectable in motorcycles, phonecards, cigarette cards, models, signs, etc.

Ashley Cowley has obtained **exclusive distribution rights** to, what would appear to be, the fifth release of a set of Indian Motorcycle phonecards.

This set, again issued by ATX American Telecard, is exclusive to Cowley's Motorcycles & Collectibles. The set contains two phonecards (see opposite page) as well as a "spectacular Indian Motorcycle hologram sticker".

As readers will note by the advert, only 1000 sets have been produced, solely for distribution in Australia. I have no doubt that demand for thse cards will be strong, especially on the secondary market, particularly as American collectors become aware of them!



INTERNATIONAL PHONECARD **EXHIBITION '95** HONG KONG

From the 15th to the 17th of September Cards International **Telephone** Collecting (Hong Kong) Ltd. (ITCC), held International **Phonecard** Exhibition. This was held at the Hong Kong Cultural Centre at Tsim Sha Tsui, Kowloon.

I was fortunate enough to be able to attend this Exhibition and the experience is well worth the time and cost, both in regards to attending the Exhibition and in viewing the territory.

This was the third Exhibition organised by ITCC (HK), the previous ones being held in May 1993 and July 1994. The move to September this year was to escape the hot, wet and humid typhoon season.

Whilst I was there, the temperature was still 27 degrees at night and 32 during the day with a humidity reading of 80-100%.

Territory of Hong Kong

The island of Hong Kong is part of the British terrritory which comprises the island itself, Kowloon peninsula, the New Territories (a mountainous mainland area adjoining Kowloon) and some 235 other offshore islands.

Some 6 million people inhabit the territory.

The territory, in part ceded by China and in part leased by Britain, will revert back to China in 1997 when the lease expires.

Card Collecting

Richard L.H. Siu, Chairman of ITCC (HK), advised that in Hong Kong, there are two major categories in card colecting, namely telephone cards and metro (train) cards.

Since each category has its own characteristics, there is no conflict of interest. Instead, each category develops parallel to each other.

ITCC (HK), through its members, is actively involved in promoting the hobby of phonecard collecting.

Organising an annual exhibition is a major component of this promotion, whilst the organisation (club) is also active in attending overseas phonecard exhibitions in Seoul, Nancheong, Tokyo and Singapore.

Further in the article when I cover the Exhibition Auction, I will touch further on some of the organisations other activities.

As with stamps and coins, phonecard collecting is a 'borderless hobby' and a way to meet new friends.

To commemorate this Exhibition, ITCC (HK) in conjunction with Hong Kong Telecom, produced a Limited Edition set of 2 phonecards (1,000 sets in total) featuring the images of butterflies over a background of day and night views of the Hong Kong Cultural Centre. The butterflies were chosen as they were felt to foster the theme of colouful phonecard collecting.

These cards (HK\$25 each) are featured on the opposite page. They were for sale at the Exhibition for HK\$350.

the flourishing **Following** deregulation and development in the telecommunications industry in Hong Kong, many new fixed network telephone companies have emerged.

New World Telephone

To date however, only one other company - in addition to Hong Kong Telecom - produces phonecards. This is New World Telephone which began with the end of the monopoly on July 1 this year.

The company has invested an initial HK\$2 billion in the construction of its new state-of-the-art network. They plan to achieve 80% coverage of Hong Kong within 18

Featured below is one of the three cards from New World Telephone's first issue. Readers will note that these are Remote Memory cards, ie., they are not actually inserted into a payphone.

You will also note that the 'Talk Talk' phonecards have an expiry date of 31/8/97.

Hong Kong Telecom

Hong Kong Telecom provides **Public Payphones** in areas of general public access. They are located throughout Hong Kong for the convenience of customers on the move. The charge for a local call is HK\$1 (approx. 17 cents Australian).

Cardphones are installed at more than 1300 sites in Hong Kong. The Cardphones operate on stored-value phonecards of denominations - HK\$50, HK\$100 and HK\$250 (\$1 Aust. = approx. \$5.8 HK).

New model Duet Cardphones have also been installed which accept \$1, \$2 and \$5 coins.

SmartCard Payphone Trials

The following is based on an article from the ITCC Magazine prepared for the Exhibition and is reproduced with their permission:-

Hong Kong's next stop towards a cashless society is undergoing trials at present. The **SmartCard payphone** is being tried out in various Telecom centres.

Developed in Britain, the payphone accepts the trial SmartCards or coins and can be used for both local and IDD calls. It can be **adapted** to accept credit cards and if the trial proves successful and the company adopts the new payphones, this facility will be added.

The company plans to phase out exising coin phones completely.

The SmartCards themselves (see page 17) are intelligent information banks the size of a credit card. Instead of the magnetic strip found on credit cards and ATM cards, they have an embedded integrated circuit (chip). Because the information cannot be erased by magnetic fields, SmartCards offer greater security than the traditional cards.

Apart from use as phonecards, SmartCards offer opportunities to **combine other applications** such as personal financial transactions and stored value for using

public transport. However, for the trial period, the SmartCards will store only telephone credit information. The SmartCards come in two denominations:

HK\$15 1,000 produced HK\$100 30,000 produced

The \$15 card has been given to senior managers, colleagues in payphone related jobs, etc. so they can test the new service.

A \$15 card was on sale at the Exhibition for **HK\$1300**. The \$100 cards are on sale (at face value) at Telecom Service Centres on Hong Kong and in Kowloon.

If the new payphones are to be introduced, this will happen early next year.

Exhibitors/Dealers

A total of 17 exhibitors/dealers were in attendance at the Exhibition. These **included three from Australia** (this country represented for the first time), including International Numismatics, Status Retail and Harbour City Stamps and Coins (all from Sydney).

A number of international card producers were also represented including **Tele Danmark** from Copenhagen who had produced the two cards featured on page 17, on occasion of the Exhibition. The cards feature a view of Hong Kong island taken from the Kowloon Peninsula, across Victoria Harbour.

Telecom Alaska were in attendance, displaying their spectacular telecards. This company introduced its chip cards in September 1992, initially as a service oriented business by operating phone stations targeted for use by Alaskan fishermen, oil workers and tourists.

Featuring beautiful scenes from the 'Last Frontier', it wasn't long before their telecards became increasingly in demand by collectors world-wide.

Slingshot Promotions from the UK also had a stand, featuring in the main, a wide variety of themes on BT phonecards.

At page 9 is featured the NASA Space Can phonecard, commissioned by Slingshop Promotions and reproduced on an ACMI Telecard. Very Collectable!

A number of dealers from both China and Hong Kong were also in attendance.

Of particular interest to me was **Mr Kiu Tai Yu**, a distinguished and respected man widely acknowledged for his craftsmanship in the horologer industry (**making timepieces**).

Mr Yu, who was born in China and now lives in Hong Kong, produces small wrist watches with tourbillon escapement carriages. Each is made to reveal the internal balance-gyrating movements through an aperture on the dial side.

To date, he has crafted and created about 10 tourbillon wristwatches. Of interest, is that a number have been reproduced on the phonecards of **Jiangsu Telecom** (China).

At page 17 you will note a reproduction of cards which feature tourbillons **No. 1 and 7**, as well as a phonecard issued depicting Mr Kiu at his work.

The two cards (No 1 and 7) were released with and without folders, as a set, in early 1994.

Since then, a further set featuring tourbillon designs No. 4 and 8 was released in March of this year. These are available in a folder as a set also.

The folders, with text in both English and Chinese, would have to be the most colourful and flamboyant that I have seen! They are extremely striking.

The Bavarian Telecard Service (Germany) had a vast variety of phonecards on display; particularly from European countries and the United States.

A couple of German phonecards which may interest the Elvis collectors include a reproduction of a classic photo of Elvis and Bill Haley (see page 17) and the card below.

Featured on page 17 also, is a photo of one of the dealers holding 40 gram silver and 14 carat gold phonecards.

These are actual phonecards which can be used in German payphones. They were in a trial/testing stage for one and a half years as a specific type of chip was developed which was not affected by the metal of the phonecard itself.

A total of 5,000 of the silver phonecards have been produced and 500 of the gold. They retail for 197 Dm and 1950 Dm respectively; A\$1 = 1.079 Dm.

Anyone wanting to obtain further information on these phonecards, can do so by initially contacting me as per the address at page 2 of this magazine.

Thematics Strong

In viewing collector buying patterns and from discussion with dealers, it was obvious that collecting by theme is very strong and probably the main aim of most collectors.

One particular dealer, **Wah Wah Stamp Co.**, had a number of cartons full of used **Japanese** phonecards. It was virtually impossible to access these cards as the crowd was usualy 5-6 deep around the stand at any given time

A large number of private collections were on display throughout the exhibition centre. Not one focussed on a single country, but contained cards of a thematic nature from around the globe.

Interestingly, Telstra's Australian phonecards featured quite prominently. Below you will note a 'Christmas collection' which includes 5 of Telstra's cards.

PHONECARDS OF PAPUA NEW GUINEA

Part 3

As the sun started its descent across the Papua New Guinea skies on Tuesday, September 16 1975, the colour guard of the Royal Pacific Islands Regiment lowered the Australian Flag for the last time in Papua New Guinea.









And in a moving ceremony carved out to the finest detail, Papua New Guinea's Governor General, Sir John Guise handed back the Flag to Sir John Kerr, the Governor General of Australia.

It has been 20 years since that day. Papua New Guinea has made great strides towards political maturity, economic prosperity and its social structure has accepted changes while holding onto many of its fascinating cultures and traditions that make Papua New Guinea truly unique. A country of just over 4 million people of the Melanesian race, it boasts to have 700 different language groups, fascinating culture and some of the world's most unique wild life.

One of these is the Bird of Paradise which is depicted on the National Flag designed by a fifteen year old schoolgirl, **Susan Karike**, from the Gulf Province.

Susan combined the Bird of Paradise with the Southern Cross indicating that the feathers of the bird represented cultural expressions in singsings. The black, red and gold colours were chosen because they are the traditional colours of the people of the country.

Telikom are proud of the country's past heritage and congratulate the people of Papua New Guinea on the occasion of the Nation's 20th Anniversary of Independance.

To commemorate this exciting occasion, Telikom has released a set of four phonecards which it feels represents both pride in the country's colourful past and expresses confidence for the future. There is a total of **20,000** sets produced.

The Exhibition itself was **extremely well attended** by the public. No 'head-count' was taken (admission being free) but I would estimate that in the vicinity of **10,000** people attended the three days.

On the first day (Friday), the Exhibition was open to the public until 8.00pm and even until then, the room was crowded.

Phonecard Auction

On the second day of the Exhibition (Saturday) ITCC (HK) conducted its **Annual Phonecard Auction**. This auction consisted of two parts, ie a **Public** and a **Charity** Auction.

All proceeds from the Charity Auction were donated to the Hong Kong Committee for the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), to help children all over the world affected by warfare and natural disasters.

Phonecards for the Charity Auction had been **donated** by a number of telecommunications authorities, card producers and business houses.

Key Numbers

Of the 74 lots for auction in the Public Section, well over half were notable for their **control numbers**, eg. the phonecards contained numbers such as - 444, 555, 666, 999, 688 (several countries), 111111, 22222, etc.

The significance being that certain numbers are **important** to a great many Chinese. It was fascinating to view the number plates on cars and even old trucks. The number which had a combination of 2, 8 and 9 in them was amazing.

I was told by a tour guide that a certain wealthy businessman had paid HK\$ for the licence plate 8888 on his Rolls Royce (viewing the vehicle was a highlight of the tour).

The number 8 signifies **prosperity** to the Chinese, whilst other key numbers are; the number 2 which signifies 'an easy life' and the number 9 as 'the peak' (being the highest individual number).

First Day Cover

In addition to the two butterfly phonecards printed to commemorate the Exhibition, a First Day Cover was also released on the 15th, the first day of the Exhibition.

The cover features a view of the Cultural Centre looking from above the harbour, as well as the various logos of the of the organisations, business houses, etc. involved in both the organisation of the Exhibition as well as attending it.

Worldwide Fund For Nature

ITCC(HK) is also actively involved in commissioning the production of phonecards together with the Worldwide Fund for Nature (WWF).

The first phonecard set produced in 1994, featured three cards in 'The Giant Panda Collection'. 3,000 sets, contained in a souvenir cover, were produced

Follow up sets featuring the 'Chinese White Dolphin', 'Flower Animals' (underwater coral) and the 'Big Cats Collection' (Lion and Tiger), were produced.



At the time of the Exhibition, ITCC (HK) were taking orders for the forthcoming release of the 'World Animal Day' and 'Tree Frog' phonecards.

Summary

In summary, the experience gained from my visit to Hong Kong was vast, in regards to both the cultural experience as well as viewing the holding of a major exhibition.

In the latter aspect, the 'behind the scenes' organisation required to hold such a major exhibition must be vast, yet, it was obviously highly satisfactory as evidenced in the smooth running of both the Exhibition and the Auction.

My thanks to Richard Siu and other members off his committee, who provided me with an insight into both the background and activities of ITCC (HK) as well as the holding of this Exhibition.

You May Have a Rare Australian Card In Your Collection!!

This article follows the one I wrote on serial (Prefix) numbers in the August '95 issue of APM (Vol 3, No 8).

To refresh your memory, the easiest way of reading a serial number on Telstra's (Telecom's) phonecards, which is on the bottom right of the reverse of the phonecard, is to eliminate all of the zero's to the left and the 5 numerals on the right of the rather cumbersome looking number.

A serial number of 0000004599556 will thus become #

'600' Phonecards

Early in 1991, some astute collectors realised that Telstra had issued some very small numbers of cards, 600 of each in fact, that did not fit in with the normal numbering of phonecards. They generally occur as the last 600 cards at the end of a print run of 100,000 or at the beginning of a print run - again, just 600 cards. The most collectable of these are:-

38 - \$20 Adelaide by Night 3899400 - 3899999 (normally a \$10 Brisbane)

41 - \$2 Generic Logo 4199400 - 4199999 (normally a \$2 Vineyard)

45 - \$10 Grampians 4599400 - 4599999 (normally a \$5 Generic)

#101 - \$10 Telecom Tower 10100000-10100599 (normally a \$5 Crocodile)

#129 - \$50 Generic 12999400-1299999 (normally a \$20 Red Cross)

All of these cards have been sighted in the Melbourne area but reports of a #99 \$10 Telecom Tower (999940-9999999) have yet to be confirmed.

Also in the series are two less dramatic cards - a \$2 Generic in the 43 series (#4399400-#439999) and a \$2 Vineyard in one of its 'normal' 41 series (#4100000-#4100599).

Two examples of '600' cards are depicted, a \$10 Grampians with the serial #4599556 and a \$20 Adelaide by night with the serial #3899904.

By the way, there is a well known and true story of a young girl who found prefix 41 \$2 Generic in the "seconds" box of a dealer at a fair and paid just 50 cents for it!!

Perfect examples of used '600' cards are hard to get and cost hundreds of dollars. Mint cards are practically unknown and very rare. Only the auctions could accurately determine their price.

The 284 "No Copyright" Phonecard

Serial number 284 is entirely one of the Old Logo \$20 Great Barrier Reef Tourist Generic Cards, the series being first issued in **February 1993**.

On the reverse of the card, the word "Copyright" should normally appear next to the ID number of the card, G930134a.

However, due to a printing error, about 7,000 of these cards escaped the word "Copyright" and are now commonly called the "284 No Copyright card".

It appears that the error occurred between #28489000 and #28495999, when the word 'Copyright' re-appears between #28496000 to the end of the run at #28499999. Plenty of the "No Copyright" examples have turned up in one-hole, multi-hole and even mint.

The <u>very collectable card</u> is actually the harder card at the <u>end of the run</u>, as far less than 4,000 would be in existence.

However, **collectors** are to be **cautioned** with some dealers who have in the past asked high prices for "No Copyright" cards in the \$20 Barrier Reef series.

This applies to serial numbers 251, 252 and 256, which do <u>not</u> have the word "Copyright" anyway. These were all printed in runs of 20,000 or more - not what you could say as being difficult cards to obtain.

The word "Copyright" first appeared with prefix number 273 in the \$20 Barrier Reef and continued through until prefix number 301 in the Old Logo series.

The words "non-refundable" were to appear later in the New Logo series.

Serial Number 502 in the Royal Life Saving Series 1994

This set was first issued in September 1994 and it was initially thought that the \$5 Surf Rescue and the \$5 Underwater started with prefix number 529 and then 14 more printings, finishing with prefix number 602.

Earlier this year however, both cards with # 502 turned up and are thought to have been printed by Telstra for **Test Card** purposes. A striking feature of both cards is the very light green arrow on the front of the card.

THE GRAPEVINE

by Insider

I commence this month's article with some further survey results:-

"What areas do you collect in phonecards"

24% of respondants collected overseas phonecards. 74% collected Australian collector packs.

Of those collecting Australian cards:

27% collected by design only; 35% collected by print only 38% collected by prefix only

Of course, all those collecting by print by definition also collected by design. Similarly, all prefix collectors also

collected by print and design.

Of the prefix collectors:

33% collected mint and used prefix 28% collected mint prefix only 39% collected used prefix only

34% collected **thematically**, with the most commonly mentioned themes being **Coca-Cola**, **Disney and animals**. Interestingly, the number of collectors mentioning collecting first issues, etc. was insignificant.

Conclusions

When this survey was conducted, 24% collected overseas cards. Possibly, nowdays, this figure would be higher. Similary, for thematic collectors, this figure would also be higher today.

A larger proportion of collectors are collecting by prefix than anyone imagined. The number collecting by mint prefix was previously thought to be only a handful due to the cost factor but appears to be a sizable proportion. In fact, more collect mint prefx than collect by design!

The near total lack of mention for first issues, etc, is perhaps due to the fact that in the very early days these type of cards were much more freely available at cheap prices. Nowdays these cards are more valuable and so for those who collected them a few years ago, they have a valuable return but new collectors would be paying high prices for a collecting theme that doesn't really have a following in established hobbies.

How many collectors would collect the first stamp or coin from each country when most are very expensive? All in all, this line of collecting appears to be a short term aberation possibly fuelled by investor interest rather than long term collector interest.

Telsta's New Custom Card Policy

Telstra has changed the issuing policy for cards, as mentioned in last month's magazine. After analysing the details for a month, it is safe to say that overall the **change is welcomed** by all involved. I see these changes as being of benefit to all collectors, both present and future, as well as dealers. Telstra has limited the number of cards to 24 a year and with the guidelines enacted, these rules should allow for the less appealing designs to be culled before we have to see them!

At the same time, with only 24 cards per year and obvious competition for the 24 places, we should not see any one individual monopolising the designs. Any manufacturer who attempts to produce too many designs will be stopped. Any manufacturer attempting to circumvent the rules or abusing collectors should find future issues hard to obtain from Telstra. Possible ways to abuse the system are hard to imagine at this point in time - Telstra seem to have thought of all eventualities!

However, the ingenuity of some entrepreneurs means that if there is a loophole to be found, it will likely be found! It is hoped that Telstra keep 'their eyes open' to any likely event and act quickly! **Congratulations Telstra** - can I have my 'Thank You' card now?

The following section is titled - 'Free Advice for Prospective Custom Card Issuers', or 'How to Make a Custom Card Without Losing One's Shirt'.

What is to stop a manufacturer producing a small number of cards (remember Telstra says "no minimum print run size is pre-determined" now) and watching the price rise to match his rising profit?

It would seem that any issue of 1,000 or less results in the price moving upwards without taking a downward step first. Examples are; 'one Australia Challenge', 'World War II' and 'Middle East Peace' sets. Other issues known to be restricted to less than 2,000, such as Thirlmere I and II trains, have not changed in price at all - neither moving up in price (signifies increased demand for stock levels) or moving down in price (signifies plenty of stock available).

The only cards restricted to between 2,000 and 3,500 cards are the \$50 'Apollo' and 'Animal Eyes' designs. None of these cards have moved up in price - in fact many have been turned into used cards in an attempt to move them! Many have been sent through re-sellers and so will actually be quite scarce items in the future.

However, it appears from these facts that to produce a custom card which instantly increases in value, one would have to make less than 1,000 cards.

This figure is actually impossible for manufacturers to 'make' money from due to the following assumptions.

Assume that the best selling cards are those with very popular themes which mainly attract royalty payments and that these payments amount to say, \$20,000 per issue. Cost per card for 10,000 is then \$2.00, bringing the unit price per \$5.00 card to say \$9.00 - (\$5.40 Telstra charge + \$2.00 royalty + \$1.60 packaging). The average card retails at, say, \$15.00, to allow a small profit after other expenses. For an issue of 1,000 cards the costs become \$20.00 just for the royalties alone!!

Further problems are that advertising costs are fixed and would represent at least \$4000 for say 3 full page, colour pages in this magazine **plus** other advertising promotional leaflets, etc. This represents a further cost for the manufacturer.

What then is the best quantity to produce for the manufacturer? After all, we don't want 'guys' making cards that don't sell and then get 'dumped', etc!!

The following table represents the costs for phonecards with and without royalties for quantities produced between 1,000 and 5,000 issues. Assumptions are that royalty fees are \$20,000 per card, advertising fees are \$4,000 per card, packaging costs are \$2.00 per card and a \$5.00 card is to be produced at Telstra's current rates.

From these figures it appears we are all safe from short issue cards aimed at restricting supply to 'rip us off'! Obviously, one needs to make at least 4,000 to make a profit (with royalties). An exceptional design without royalties would have a chance however!

This price information combined with demand levels means that it will not be possible to force a price up by restricting print quantities. A card without royalties attached does have a chance of success, produced in low enough numbers to make a profit as well as rise in price - but it would have to be an exceptional design! Any picture of a kangaroo for example will just not do! The best thematic cards are all cards attracting royalties.

Most 'nice' designs on less popular thematics need to sell at around \$10.00 and the better cards (with royalties) sell for around \$18.00 to \$24.00.

Taking this analysis further we can look at the likely profit for a certain number of the issue remaining unsold; and having to be sold through re-sellers at less than face value. The most likely number of a general issue custom card selling, is around 2,000 only. The top of the line designs may reach 2,500 to 3,000 'at a push'.

The market is showing very healthy signs of growth - in fact growth has been quite strong now for several months. The best way to describe events is to use Keating's terminology: 'We have broken the boom/bust cycle and are now in line for a sustained period of steady growth'.

Collector numbers are increasing, prices have turned around and are creeping upwards at a sustainable rate matching the increase in demand. Dealers are reacting quite interestingly to these changed events. The dealers who had phonecards as a sideline (as long as it was easy money), are moving back into their main lines, be they stamps or coins.

For dealers to make phonecards pay nowdays they have to work at the job like any other occupation. Dealers who limited themselves to Australian material were left behind when collectors demanded thematic cards. This means that less stock will be held by dealers so this will hasten the day when early material becomes hard to find.

Collectors are still waiting out new issues of Custom cards until the price comes down to reasonable levels.

The unique concept of featuring a movie spectacular on PhoneCard and combining it with a CD single of the movie sound track was **first** seen with Disney's 'The Lion King' PhoneCard Presentation Set in 1994.

Pocahontas is now the second of its kind, containing in the Set, a \$5.00 PhoneCard and the CD single 'Colours of the Wind' by Vanessa Williams from the movie soundtrack.

Jason Crooks also advises that the popularity of (and demand for) the **Mickey Mouse 1 and 2 sets** continues to amaze. Event Masters is **buying back** set 1 at \$550 (issue price \$160 - April '94) and set 2 at \$200 (issue price \$160 July '95).

It just goes to show, if a balance can be struck between a popular theme and the 'correct' print issue, collector demand is generated on an on-going basis.

McDonalds

Featured opposite are the four phonecards referred to in the last issue of APM, which have been released by McDonalds. Arguably, the 'best' McDonalds' cards yet released.

You will note also, that Telecom New Zealand has utilised one of the designs on the cover of its recent, 1st issue of New Zealand International Phonecard Collector magazine.

WW II Themes


Two separate issues feature a WW II theme in this, the 50th Anniversary of the end of this war.

PHONECARDS EXHIBITION SINGAPORE '95

This was the first international phonecard fair that I decided to attend and but for encouragement from the man behind the 'Phantom of the Opera' phonecard, I would not have done so.

Nelson Hopkins suggested we share a table (very expensive at overseas fairs) to reduce expenses and after discussing the pros and cons of going to the fair with my wife Barbara, we decided to 'give it a go'.

Nelson arranged all my travel plans as he is a travel agent and it was left to me to decide what to pack in a weight allowance of only 20kg. How could any self respecting phonecard dealer get enough cards into 20kg as well as leave space for a few items like clothes and a toothbrush? I checked with the leading dealers with experience in tripping around - Edlins of Canberra.

Wise Advice?

The answer is simple said Ed Jnr.; "Pack as much as you can cram into your hand luggage, take weight training lessons for the upper and lower arms, ensure your face doesn't contort due to the arm strain and run past the lady at the international departure gate who is responsible for checking that passengers hand luggage is under 5kg"!!

Well, this seemed good advice and so Barbara and I sorted out what to take. Do the locals prefer to buy packs, mint or used, we asked ourselves? A quick call to another jet-setting dealer - Hendro Winatan from New Zealand - revealed the following helpful answer; "take a variety of items". "But Hendro; what is the best thing to take for the local market?" Back came the reply; " take a variety of items"!

Deciding not to pursue this line of questioning, we decided to take loose cards due to the weight problem. Everything packed, I trooped off to the Post Office to weigh my luggage - 19.2kg! Hand luggage 24kg on one hand and 10kg the other hand!!

The day dawned and I met Nelson at the airport. Luggage checked in, we went and sat outside the International departure entrance. All was quiet but soon a large group of Chinese came along and walked through the gate. This was our cue and we followed them in, saw where the 'lady official' was and skipped around the other side. The 25 metres to the customs desk was tricky as my arms were about to let out! I just got there in time and from there it was a short way and no trouble to get to the plane!

Singapore!

The view of central Australia from the area is fantastic and eight hours later we arrived in Singapore to be

whisked off to our separate hotels - only I was delivered to the wrong hotel!! Sorted this out soon enough however and boarded a taxi to my hotel.

Australian time was now about 12.30 and so I was feeling tired. Since the fair started the next day I set my wake up call and went straight to sleep. Following breakfast next morning, I taxied to the fair venue which was in a large shopping centre.

Singapore has these super modern shopping centres which made me think that the country had come a long way from 25 years ago, when as a child I travelled through Singapore with my family on our way to live in England. No big shopping centres and modern roads back then!

Thirty Eight Exhibitors

The fair was in the 'sunken' floor of the shopping centre and altogether, 38 exhibitors were set up in this area, sorrounded by 3 floor levels of balconies which later on would see many shoppers staring down at the huge throng of collectors swarming through the area looking for cards for their collections.

Dealers were in attendance from countries from all over the world - Japan, Thailand, New Zealand, USA, Britain, Germany and Australia spring to mind. Collectors even travelled from places as far away as France to attend. Being from many different countries, the dealers had a great variety of stock which meant the collectors had a huge choice - more so than our biggest fairs where many dealers have similar material to offer collectors.

Each day of the fair was very busy with Saturday the busiest. A strange local custom I was unaware of, related to the business hours - 10.00am to 9.00pm was the norm! The locals were still busy and wide awake at 10pm after we had packed up to go home for the night! Of course they had all slept in to start the day later at 10.00am.

The biggest problem was the humidity and the fact that the air conditioning system was pushed to get cool air squeesed between the bodies to get into the middle of the centre - right where Nelson and I were located.

Telstra & Telecom New Zealand

Telecom New Zealand and the Telstra Corporation were in attendance and both gave excellent representation for their country's phonecards.

Telecom New Zealand have a policy of 'tripping around' attending fairs all over the place and whilst it must cost them 'a small fortune' to do so, the interest they generate amongst new collectors in these countries will surely return dividends by increasing the international desirability of collecting New Zealand cards.

It is hoped that Telstra can follow a similar policy to promote our cards around the world.

What were collectors collecting?

The dealers tables that were swamped for the whole three days of the fair were the Japanese dealers. Dealers from this country do not do much travelling outside of Japan itself and collectors were pouring over their tables looking for thematic cards of all descriptions.

I myself spent a considerable sum at their tables before I had made a sale, purchasing the nice Coke and Airline cards that I could find. I just missed out on a set of 'Marilyn' cards and determined next year to get in early! Most of these good cards were gone in the first morning but many nice used cards were still available over the three days. The most popular thematics were Coca-Cola, Disney, airlines and comic characters.

Coca-Cola

With the Coca-Cola cards, anything coming from Japan as well as any cards issued with quantities of less than around 1,500, were obviously the sought after and hard to find cards. These cards invariably sold out before the fair ended - some Japanese cards were gone on the first morning.

Interestingly, the Australian issues were generally selling at a slight discount to issue price.

Summation

At the end of the three days dealers evaluated the results and reported a mixed outcome. Some were extremely happy whilst others were just OK. It appears that those dealers having what the collectors wanted did well, but if the dealer did not have the right stock he found it difficult. Collector's interests did not seem to be the same as last year so a dealer who did very well then, may have been dissapointed with this year's results.

(In other words, as Hendro advised - "Take a variety of items" - Ed).

The organisers are to be congratulated on their efforts which involved 18 months of preparation. Everything about the fair ran very smoothly with the exception of a lack of cool air on occasions!

The organisers should be very encouraged about the results and next year's fair should be another highlight for collectors and dealers in the region.



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THE PHONECARDS OF THAILAND

Allan Douglas

Having made 18 trips to Thailand for holidays in the last 9 years, I was very happy when the country issued its first phonecards in 1991. When I first read of the Thai phonecards, I made contact with gentleman who lived in Bangkok and came to an arrangement where I would supply him with each set of Australian phonecards in mint condition in exchange for Thai phonecards in the same condition.

This arrangement worked very well and on my next visit I met him and his wife, at which time we had an extended discussion on the merits of Thai phonecards. From then, I was completely 'hooked' on that country's cards. Unfortunately, my friend became very busy with his work and found he did not have the spare time to keep me supplied with Thai cards.

Dealer Contact

It was on my next visit to Bangkok that I decided to look for a reliable dealer where I could simply buy each new issue from Thailand. I found a lady, who in partnership with her husband owned a stamp, coin and phonecard shop, within three minutes walk from the hotel that I always stayed at.

It was at her shop that I was able to buy my first catalogue of Thai phonecards which was written by Mr Chuan Soontranan.

On my last visit to Bangkok in July 1995, I was able to purchase two copies of Mr Soontranan's latest catalogue which was in pocket book size and is a wonderful aid to collectors of Thai phonecards.

English is used widely in these catalogues and so it is very easy to understand the various aspects of Thai cards. Also, having Thai friends in Bangkok, means that I always have someone who can translate the Thai cards into English for me

Checklist

The following is a checklist covering the first years of phonecard issues in Thailand:-

13-04-34 ie. 13-04-1991 **Issue Date:**

1. Baht 50 Ratanakosintr 22,000

This card appears to be grey in colour and I can only guess that the Telephone Organisation of Thailand (T.O.T) was not happy with the look of their card when the first batch was delivered.

As a result, this card was re-issued (see 2. below) with another colour added and being blue, is more attractive to the eye.

I obtained the original grey card in a used state at a fair in Bangkok for A\$50 and still regret that I did not buy a mint copy, now that the price for this particular card has risen steeply.

Even though the five cards listed so far were issued over a period of four months it is my opinion, that as the scenes on the cards were all from the same area, they can be considered as a set.

At this point I would like to say that I have found that the Thai cards follow the same colour code all the way through, eg., the Baht 25 card has a green strip at the top of the card; the Baht 50 card has a blue strip; the Baht 100 card has a red strip; whilst the Baht 240 card has a vellow strip.

This was the first advertising card issued in Thailand and was on sale at Shell service stations in the country. This card also carries advertising on its back.

Low Issues

Taking the issue of Thai cards on a yearly basis, it can be seen that Thailand only issued 6 different cards for the 1991 year and that included the variation of the first Baht 50 card.

It appears that the T.O.T. may have been 'testing the waters' with its early issues to ascertain which card values were the most popular with the public.

It also appears that the Baht 50 and Baht 100 are the most popular values purchased by the public in Thailand. as the next 11 cards to be listed are all of those values.

Cards 13 to 16 appear to be a set of four but only use the two more popular values. Also, the mintage figures are not really huge as will be shown later on in this listing when we will see mintages of up to 600,000 for a B100 phonecard.

After seeing the earlier full colour cards of Thailand, I found the Art Pattern cards quite plain in their two colour format.

Another aspect of T.O.T's issue policy is that some cards are issued much later than the date on the card. I am not sure why this happens and I am always interested in learning more information about Thai phone cards that any other collector may be able to give me.

In my own collection, I put the cards in my Thai albums in the sequence of the dates shown on the cards. I have had to make a few exceptions to this rule as will be shown later with the issue of the first high value cards that were issued for **international** calls by T.O.T.

I acquired those two cards from my stockist when I was in Bangkok in February this year but the dates on the cards are actually 01-10-35, which is 1 October 1992.

It was in 1994 that I was able to buy two cards of B50 and B500 values that were issued by LENSO. These cards were chip cards and had the wording on the back of the card, "International Phonecard".

I was also able to obtain the second issue of two more Lenso cards in Bangkok in July this year.

I will cover these cards further on in my checklist of the cards of Thailand.

Over the years, many fine catalogues have been produced (including the catalogues produced by the Australian Phonecard Collectors Club in Adelaide) and I do not wish to detract from such excellent productions. However, the "Complete Guide" for myself is just so easy to follow. The prefix (serial) numbers range, at time of printing, is from # 0 to # 915 and further space is available to # 962.

Summaries are then given for Telstra International issues, the "600" phonecards, cancelled issues, missing prefixes, Limited Editions, Advertising issues and some of the Custom cards.

Three pages are devoted to 'Sorted Telecom Phonecard Issues' (a great help to collectors working on a simplified basis) and then five pages of 'Yearly Listings', from 1989 to 1995.

All of the Custom/Private cards are listed by prefix number and the publication is 'rounded off' with listings for PayTel, Card Phone Australia and Payphonics.

At a cost of just \$5.00, this catalogue is a **must** for every serious collector of Australian phonecards.

Dear F.C. - I bring your attention to the article by Warren Titcher elsewhere in this magazine, titled "You may Have a Rare Card in Your Collection". The card you have (as per your photocopy) is prefix number 252, which was not intended to have the wording 'Copyright' printed on it. As such, it is worth only \$2-3 in a multi hole condition.

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The Early Issues of CHINA

Cyril Fox

What do a camel caravan, Chairman Mao, a narcissus flower and a reclining buddha have in common?

They are all images which have appeared on local Chinese phonecards (before the advent of national card issues).

Prior to September of 1994, phonecards were issued only on a regional, provincial or metropolitan basis in China. This complex situation was put to bed with the establishment of China Telecom which assumed the authority to issue cards for the entire nation.

Before National Issues

The purpose of my writing is to look back at the way things were prior to the appearance of the first national cards. The period of the localised card issues of China is a fascinating time capsule in the history of phonecards and deserves further study.

According to my research, at least 53 local authorities issued cards in China in the period 1985 to 1994. A further 5 local authorities reportedly issued cards, but I have yet to sight evidence of these emissions.

Extremely Rare

Many of the earliest Chinese cards are impossible to find today, but their rarity is not generally appreciated. The first cards issued in China were plain green and white cards made by Autelca of Switzerland for the Shenda Telephone Company of Shenzhen City in Guangdong Province.

The rarest cards are some of the early trial cards supplied by Alcatel Bell to the cities of Beijing, Guangzhou and Shanghai and three values of "Red Telephone" GPT cards provided for Shanghai. The most valuable of these cards would be worth A\$30,000 or more today!

Understanding the Telcos

A major difficulty associated with the collection of the local Chinese cards is unravelling the Chinese spelling of the name of the issuing authority. Few local issues showed the telco name in English.

For the sake of uniformity, all spelling of Chinese place names in this article follows the widely accepted Pinyin spelling system. For example, the place name "Kwangtung" is now rendered "Guangdong". I am greatly indebted to Mr Wang Chuanjin of Nanjing for his invaluable assistance with the translations.

The old local Chinese phonecards are frequently incorrectly attributed. The cards issued by Lhasa City

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are, for example, commonly attributed to the region of Tibet. This is incorrect. In order to avoid this type of confusion I must be quite adamant that the ONLY logical and sensible way of attributing the local cards of China is by the name of the issuing instrumentality (eg. "Telecommunications Bureau of Nanjing") which appears on the back of the card in most cases. Unfortunately the issuer's name is seldom given in English.

The local phonecards of China are now rapidly disappearing from the marketplace and I predict that within five years such cards will be viewed as phonecard classics and that they will be avidly sought after by collectors both in China and throughout S-E Asia!



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THE JAPANESE EXPERIENCE

(Part 8.) Movies

Don Hill, Melbourne Phonecard Centre

Movie cards are a popular theme to collect on Japanese phonecards because they are produced regularly and in sufficient numbers to ensure the majority of cards are obtainable for under \$15 each in used condition and under \$30 each in mint condition.

Movie cards are produced to coincide with new film releases as well as being issued to advertise the release of films on videos. Look carefully on many movie cards and you will notice some expression such as "Video Cassette" or "Home Movie World", etc. Also noticed, is that many of these phonecards have the words "Not for Sale" printed on the front of the card.

In the Japanese Guidebook printed by Sirius, over 500 movie cards are shown - I have shown a selection of these on the opposite page. As well as cards featuring the actual movie, other cards are made and collected which feature movie stars.

Some interesting movie cards produced include a series on the "Thunderbirds" (18 are shown in the catalogue), and "James Bond" movies (over 18 shown in the catalogue). One set of 15 cards was produced featuring James Bond with 15 of the films in a numbered series. The normal numbering system for 'free' cards was altered to produce numbers from F-390-007-1 TO F-390-007-15. The number incorporating the famous "007" number of course!

Anyone keen to obtain the **Japanese Catalogue** can pick one up at the International Phonecard Fair in Sydney in early November from the Melbourne Phonecard Centre table for the price of \$49.00.

MCDONALDS U-CARDS

Whilst in Hong Kong for the International Phonecard Exhibition '95, and rumaging through one dealers eqivelant of our \$2.00 'scratch box', I came across some cards depicting the famous McDonald's logo and a Hamburger.

To look at and feel, these cards are the image of Japanese phonecards. They are however the McDonalds U-Cards which are used to pay for hamburgers as well as other McDonald's products.

The value of the card is stored magnetically on the cards (as with a Japanese phonecard) and have holes punched in them as they are used.





Depicted are a 3000 and a 5000 Yen U-Card. There is a third card in this series which is of a 1000 Yen denomination. As 5000 Yen is eqivelant to approximately A\$82, quite a few hamburgers can be purchased (although costs in Japan are much higher in comparison to Australia).

I obtained quite a few 1-hole 3000 and 5000 Yen cards, so it can be seen that large sittings at McDonalds are common (maybe it was a Sumo wrestler dinner sitting?).




